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RULES

2. Make projects no larger than 24x24x24". The primary material should be wood, but may incorporate other materials. Examples of Toys With Movable Parts include pull toys and cars. Examples of Toys Without Movable Parts include puzzles and doll furniture.
3. Please follow Consumer Product Safety Commission guidelines:
 - Nontoxic woods and wood finishes only;
 - No parts smaller than 1 1/4" square on toys for children under 3 years of age;
 - No sharp corners or points;
 - Pull strings longer than 12" should not have beads or other attachments that could tangle and form a loop.

CRACKING THE OAK SAFE DIMENSIONS

In every issue of WOOD magazine, we include well over 2,000 drawing labels and dimensions. And unfortunately, every once in a while an incorrect one slips through and makes it into print.



That's what happened with the mini safe on page 78 of the October, 1988 issue. We built the project (two in fact), only to put a wrong dimension on the drawing. The length of the sides A should be 5 1/2" instead of the 4 1/2" shown on the drawing. And, the length of the box back (C) should be 4 15/16" instead of the 3 15/16" listed in the Bill of Materials.

We sincerely apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused you.

ARMSTRONG CEILING SOLUTION #33

IN SUPPORT OF LOGGERS

I enjoy your magazine very much, especially the article in the June 1988 issue on stave-bowl turning that shows the techniques involved in creating top-quality wood bowls. I hope your magazine will continue in this direction. However, what attracted my attention was the "Talking Back" letter and your excellent response concerning preserving the tropical rain forests.

Your response was that commercial harvesting of mahogany has little to do with the destruction of rain forests, but rather the conversion to agriculture, roads, and mining destroy the forests. I agree.

I live in a community where loggers harvest redwood trees for lumber. Here, the logging companies replant for future harvests. They primarily replant in areas cleared for temporary roads and work areas.

I write this because I continually see letters and articles unfairly attacking logging concerns. Most loggers have solid practices; they are in business to stay. I realize your magazine is not a political publication, but I wish to call your attention to the extensive destruction of forests around the world by those involved in illegal drugs.

Recently, for example, several of our government officials flew over large areas of Peru and were appalled at the destruction of forests—as far as the eye could see—for cocaine production. Those involved in illegal drugs could care less about our forests let alone human beings.

We talked to Mitch Talcove, owner of a sawmill in Mexico and importer of exotic hardwood from Central America. Mitch, who lived for 8½ years in Mexico, believes some peasants grow marijuana or coca because of economic necessity. "It's the only way they can survive," Mitch says. "We say slashing and burning isn't good for the world, but they're thinking about their families. What would you do?"

"You can't stop illegal people from doing everything. And there is no way we can stop deforestation. People down there believe they must slash the land to try to grow crops or graze cattle."

Although he has seen illegal slashing and burning right along the road, Mitch and other sawmill operators face stiff penalties and fines if they bring a dead or burned tree to a sawmill. By law, the Mexican forestry department must first mark each tree his company cuts and takes to the sawmill.

"Clear cutting and selectively harvesting hardwood are two different things," Mitch says. "Slashing and burning have nothing to do with the hardwood business. I often see a tree that's going to be burned, but I'm not allowed to use it!"

SHOP TIP SAVES A YOUNGSTER'S EYE

Woodworking has been my hobby for more than 20 years. I really would like to take this time to tell you that I think your magazine is the best. I read every magazine from cover to cover many times over.

Though many of your "Tips for Your Shop (And Ours)" are well known, some are new to me. I must tell you what happened in my shop just last week. **TWO WAYS TO
MEASURE DIAMETERS**


Accurately measuring the diameter of an object smaller than 1" can be difficult if you don't have a calipers. Likewise, it's tough to determine the exact diameter of larger round objects.

TIP 1: Use squarely cut wood strips and a ruler to determine the diameter of small objects, such as bolts or toy parts. Butt the two strips against the item you're measuring, and align one end with a mark on the scale as shown below to take your reading.



TIP 2: On larger objects, use two framing squares or a framing square and a combination square as shown below to determine the object's diameter. To ensure accuracy, measure the item twice.


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BENCH HOOK SECURELY HOLDS WOODCARVING STOCK

Relief carving requires using both hands on the carving tool. For comfort and safety, securing the carving on a tabletop helps greatly.

TIP: You can easily make an inexpensive bench hook to hold carving pieces. Along two adjoining sides of a base of $\frac{3}{4}$ " plywood, attach 1×2 " rails with 90° notches cut to your needs. Fasten 1×2 " cleats along two sides of the bottom of the base in the opposite corner from the notches. If possible, hold down the bench hook by securing one of the cleats in a vise. You can omit the bench cleats and clamp the assembly to your benchtop with C-clamps.



**PUT A BIB ON MESSY
CONTACT CEMENT CANS**

Drippings from your brush can quickly coat the rim of a container and dry, making it practically impossible to put the lid back on tightly. A poor seal will allow air to harden the remaining cement.

TIP: Form a piece of aluminum foil into place as a bib along at least half of the can's rim. This will catch the inevitable overflow of glue, preventing rim gum-up.


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**GET EXTRA LIFE
FROM SCROLL-SAW BLADES**

Normally, only about one-third of the length of a scroll saw blade is used. When that section becomes dull, nearly two-thirds of the blade remains sharp.

TIP: Take advantage of the upper one-third of the blade by building an auxiliary table of a thickness of your choosing. For instance, make the auxiliary table $\frac{3}{4}$ " thick if you cut a lot of $\frac{3}{4}$ " stock. Clamp this spacer to the table of your scroll saw, or attach it with double-faced tape. The auxiliary table will limit the thickness of the material you can cut, but in most cases, the stock will be thin, anyway.

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


HERE'S HOW TO CENTER A BIT IN AN EXISTING HOLE

Enlarging a hole in wood or other material requires a lot of guesswork to start the bit in the exact center.

TIP: Insert a scrap of dowel the diameter of the existing hole and slightly recessed—about $\frac{1}{16}$ ". Fit a drill bit the same size of the hole into the recess and tap the end of the shank just hard enough to mark the dowel center. Use this mark to start drilling the larger hole.




LOOSEN WING NUTS

A tight wing nut can chew up fingers before you get it loosened.

TIP: Make a special wrench out of a 12" length of $\frac{1}{2}$ "-diameter electrical conduit and a 4" length of $\frac{1}{4}$ " steel rod. With a hacksaw, cut notches $\frac{3}{16}$ " wide and $\frac{1}{2}$ " deep in one end of the conduit, as shown below. About $\frac{3}{4}$ " from the opposite end, drill a $\frac{1}{4}$ " hole, insert the steel rod, and glue in place with epoxy. Keep one wrench with your router table.

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
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**QUICK, CLEAN
DRILLING GUIDE**

It's a challenge to center the holes on the opposite side of a butt or dado joint for a divider or shelf. You can mark the line with a faint pencil mark, but you'll do extra sanding on the unfinished wood to remove each mark.

TIP: Place a strip of masking tape matching the width of the divider or shelf along the desired line, mark the hole locations on it, then drill away. The tape reduces the chances of chipping, and it pulls off easily without leaving layout marks.

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
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
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MINI DUST COLLECTOR

Sawing and sanding operations generate a lot of irritating fine dust in the workshop.

TIP: Installing furnace filters on both sides of a box fan offers an inexpensive way to gather up dust. Use wire to hold the filters in place, and position the fan adjacent to the work area so it pulls air away from you. Clean the filters with a shop vacuum when they become dust-filled.

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
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A HANDY LAZY SUSAN

Moving around your project while finishing can become bothersome.

TIP: A turntable allows you to stand in one spot and move the work into range. From $\frac{3}{4}$ " plywood, cut pieces measuring 24" x 24" and 15" x 15". Fasten a 6" ballbearing heavy-duty lazy susan fixture (available at many hardware stores) to the bottom of the larger piece. Then, fasten this assembly to the smaller piece. Add a 2" x 4" x 15" piece to the center of the bottom side of the base to secure the turntable in a vise.




LEVELING WITH A WIRE

Squaring up a tilting table on a drill press so it's perpendicular to a drill bit can prove tedious.

TIP: Instead of using a square, a small length of coat hanger or other stiff wire will do the job quickly and accurately. Cut a length of wire approximately 6" long, and bend right angles in it as shown. Don't worry if the angles aren't exactly 90°. Chuck one end into the drill and tighten. Raise the table so it barely touches the wire. Slowly rotate the drill chuck 180° by hand so you can detect any high or low spots in the table.



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FREUD'S BISCUIT JOINER: It Works as Easy as 1·2·3




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The Freud joinery machine is a plunge cutting tool. It has a rotating carbide cutter that creates an elliptical slot in the surfaces to be joined. The splines, or "biscuits" as they are called, are inserted into the slot along with any water based glue. Because the biscuits are made of wood, the water makes them swell in the joint making an extremely strong and firm bond.



1 Lay Out

The boards that are to be joined should be placed together and the location of each joint marked on both pieces. The vertical fence is adjusted to the depth desired for the slots. Turning the wing nuts on the side



of the fence allows it to move easily in the tracks. The fence is accurately calibrated to allow you to easily move it to center of the joint (See Figure 1).

At this point, you have determined the horizontal location of the joint by marking the wood and vertical location of the joint by setting the fence.

At a List price of \$285.55, the Freud JS100 Joiner Machine is now on sale through your local Freud distributor for \$195.00.

MITER JOINTS? NO PROBLEM!

By reversing the fence, you can join mitered pieces (See Figure 2). The steps are the same.



Mark the location of your joint and set the fence to the vertical height needed. Line up the fence with the mark and make your cut. Apply glue — insert biscuits — clamp!

"ON-THE-BALL" SANDING

Smoothly sanding the inside of bowls being turned on a lathe can be terribly frustrating as well as hard on the fingers.

TIP: Wrap sandpaper or emery cloth around a sponge rubber ball before you start. The ball fits the inside curvature, enabling you to do a more uniform job of sanding than you can do with hand-held sandpaper.



POWER TOOL HOLSTERS

In a confined workspace, everything ends up in a pile along the back edge of the workbench.

TIP: Use thin-wall plastic pipe to custom-make holders for power tools and hand tools, too. Cut the pipe into 8" lengths, and notch to fit various tools, including your electric drill and glue gun. Drill a hole in the back side and attach the holder to a wall with screws.




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
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AVOIDING A STICKY TAPE SITUATION

It's not an open-and-shut case to fix a sticking door. Until you find the offending area, you don't know where to attack the problem.

TIP: Place a sheet of carbon paper in the door with the carbon side facing the edge of the door. When you close the door, the paper will leave marks where the bind occurs. You may have to move the paper and close the door several times.

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
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

FILLING THE NEED FOR A TINY BIT

Every once in a while, you find yourself lacking the precise size of drill bit to do a particular job, especially in small diameters.

TIP: Use a small finishing nail or brad in place of a standard bit. Snip or hacksaw off the head before putting it into the drill chuck. With the nail held securely in the chuck, grind the nail down by rotating it as you hold the side of the nail against a grinding stone, or sanding disc as shown below.




ESCAPE ROUTE FOR CUTOFF PIECES

A possible hazard when making miter cuts with a radial-arm saw occurs when cutoff pieces become trapped between the blade and the fence. The spinning blade can launch these scraps like bullets.

TIP: Notch out about 1½" of the fence as shown. This prevents the cutoff scrap from binding between the blade and fence.

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
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

MUZZLING A 3-JAW CHUCK BEFORE IT CAN BITE

The jaw heels of some popular 3-jaw chucks protrude enough to pose a real hazard to the operator whose knuckles or tools venture too close to the whirling edges.

TIP: Protect yourself with plastic tubs like the kind that hold margarine. Cut the bottom out of the tub and line the inside with foam-rubber weather stripping for a friction fit. With this installed, the shield will prevent you from getting whacked by the jaw heels, even if your knuckles get close enough for contact.

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CORDLESS SAWS: A DYING BREED?

Battery-powered portable circular saws made a big splash when they came on the tool scene several years ago. With sales of cordless drills and jigsaws already going along nicely, self-contained hand-held circular saws seemed to be the next logical step in the progression of portable tool battery technology.

But wait a minute. Sales of the tools soon slowed to a snail's pace; many users found the tools underpowered and limited in their applications. Recently, one of the three players in this area, Hitachi, dropped its cordless circular saw from the U.S. market.

Does this mean it's time to bury the idea of cordless circular saws? Maybe not. The other two makers, Milwaukee and Makita, plan to stay in the market. An official of Skil Corporation, a long-time innovator in portable circular saw technology, told us the firm plans to make a cordless version when improved battery technology makes it practical in terms of power and price.

Moreover, Black & Decker, a pioneer in cordless tool technology

that opted to stay out of the battery-powered circular saw fray, may be getting involved in a big way. B&D will introduce, on a limited basis, a shoulder- or belt-carried battery pack that delivers 24 volts—double the voltage of current cordless tools. And, Black & Decker officials tell us a circular saw will be one of the tools that hook up to the 6.6-pound battery. Its one drawback: a \$500 price tag. Have heart, though, the price of new tool technology seems to drop with time. Take for instance, Skil's first portable circular saw, introduced in 1924. The machine's price was a then-whopping \$160.

RYOBI BUYS MAKER OF SEARS POWER TOOLS

Ryobi Limited of Tokyo, Japan, recently bought Singer Corporation's Motor Products Division, supplier of hand-held power tools for Sears. The division has plants in Pickens and Anderson, S.C.

In a joint statement, the heads of Ryobi and Singer said: "... Ryobi is familiar with Sears' requirements

and is deeply committed to further enhancing the Motor Products Division's reputation for product quality and innovation." Prior to the sale, Ryobi private-labeled a portable planer and a resaw band saw for Sears. Officials of Sears, headquartered in Chicago, had no comment on the sale.

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A species of common ash from the Far East produces one of the world's most rare and treasured woods. Native to Manchuria, but transplanted to the mountainous regions of Japan centuries ago, this particular ash owes its fame to a uniquely figured grain.

Tamo, also called *damo*, *shioji*, and *yachidama*, looks like white ash. Very few trees, however, produce figured wood that resembles peanut shells laid side by side. Tamo trees develop this peanut figure when strong vines encircle their trunks. This girdling restricts the flow of nutrients. So the tree grows in spurts, and the grain shows it.

When all timber harvesting was done by hand, workers would find such a tree, and in felling it, sometimes discover only half the wood to be figured. Because they had to carry the wood down the mountain on their shoulders, they

only took the figured wood.

For centuries, the peanut-figured wood was reserved for items made for Japanese royalty and shoguns, due to the difficulty in obtaining it. Japanese master craftsmen, seeking a more reliable supply of figured tamo, eventually learned to tie ropes around saplings. The controlled constriction of the rope produced, over many years, the same figure in the tree. However, as these propagated tamo trees were harvested, the figured wood grew rarer and rarer.

Now, Japan relies heavily on the import of fine cabinetwoods. And peanut-figured tamo — tied, slow-grown, and cultivated — has become very rare. It's available only in Japan as extremely expensive, minutely-thin veneer used for the most exclusive projects. ♦

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Most saw setting gauges have at least one or two main weaknesses. They either rest partially on the insert plate which is usually not the same height as the main table, or they are so thin that it is difficult to ensure that teeth are being gauged at the top of the arc. This Gauge is made from machined Aluminum a full ¾" thick and 9" long. With ¼" graduations on one end and ½" on the other, it will indicate any height from ⅛" to 2". Most useful for Table Saws but also handy for Router depth setting. The markings are vertical on one face and horizontal on the other, so you can read them easily and accurately.

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In the last century, the bark of hemlock was sometimes worth more than the wood. The leather-tanning and fur-processing industries demanded hemlock bark for its high tannic acid content. Hides and skins infused with a tannic-acid solution become soft and strong. Tragically, stands of hemlock in the eastern United States and Canada were stripped of their bark, then left on the stump to die.

It wasn't until the '40s boom in wood-frame house construction that hemlock came into its own as lumber. And then, the eastern hemlock's West Coast cousin provided the raw material. Today, hemlock lumber from Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia (where the species represents 60 percent of the mature coastal forest) feeds home construction and millwork manufacturers. Hemlock even gives some hardwoods a run for their money as a lower cost, yet strong, easy-to-work furniture stock. In fact, this softwood actually grows harder with age!


Wood identification

Botanist Stephen L. Endlicher christened hemlock in 1847 with the genus name *tsuga*. The Japanese word means "yew-leaved," referring to its short, flat, and contrary to legend, non-poisonous needles.

Eastern hemlock (*Tsuga canadensis*) plants its roots from Canada south to Georgia and west across the Great

Lakes states to Minnesota. Western hemlock (*Tsuga heterophylla*), sometimes called Pacific hemlock, thrives in the moist coastal ranges from Alaska to northern California, but also climbs mountain slopes in Idaho and Montana.

Growing to greater size than its eastern relative—which only becomes 80' tall and 36" in diameter in 250 years—western hemlock represents one of the lumber industry's few remaining sources of large, clear timber. Trees 100 years old can be 150' tall, with a 24" diameter.

The bark of both hemlock species appears cinnamon-red to brown

in color and has broad, deep ridges. Seed-bearing brown cones sprout at the ends of branch shoots.

Little color variance between hemlock's heartwood and sapwood results in a nearly uniform buff color in both species. The wood of western hemlock weighs more (about 29 pounds per cubic foot, dry) than that of its eastern relative. Western hemlock also is harder, stronger, straighter-grained, and resin-free.

Working properties
You can work hemlock easily with hand or power tools. In

crosscutting, however, expect some tearout.

The wood grips screws and accepts all glues without a problem. Western hemlock, with its straight grain and finer texture, sands to a silky, reflective smoothness. Because the western variety is resin-free, it accepts any paint, stain, or clear finish with more satisfying results than the eastern species. Don't use either hemlock species outdoors without preservative treatment.

Uses in woodworking

The construction industry now frames, sheathes, and floors with hemlock. Mills turn the wood into windows, frame-and-panel doors, moldings, and paneling. Due to its strength and wear-resistance, hemlock also becomes reliable ladders and stair components.


Ease of machining and finishing have made hemlock an increasingly popular alternative to hardwood for furniture and cabinets. Lack of pitch and resin also makes hemlock ideal for a sauna's dry heat.

Cost and availability

Vast logging operations on the Pacific Northwest coast keep hemlock widely available in the West and Midwest. On the East Coast, even availability of local hemlock will be spotty.

If you need them, thick boards up to 14" wide aren't rare. And, hemlock costs less than Ponderosa or white pine.

UP IN SMOKE

ONE WOODWORKER'S PIPE DREAM

Vermont carver Al Baier always sets a match to his work!

Carver Al Baier lives a pipe dream. He puffs choice tobacco through fine briar. He carves what he likes, when he likes. He meets people from far-away places. He's having more fun than a kid with a new bicycle. And, he's making money.

One of only a handful of pipe carvers in the United States, Al has whittled away thousands of dollars' worth of expensive, imported briar wood over the last 10 years. At selling prices ranging from \$75 to \$1,000, his pipes more than pay for the stock.

Ever since his win in a national pipe-carving competition a few

years back, Al has become known for his carving talent, resulting in frequent special orders—sometimes unusual ones. Two years ago, for instance, he received an order for a moose-head pipe from a man in Chicago. "He wanted the pipe to depict 'Bullwinkle,' the Vermont bull moose that received national news coverage for falling in love with a cow. I had to find a stuffed moose I could copy!" he chuckles.

MEDITERRANEAN WOOD GIVES YOU A SLOW BURN

"Briar makes the best pipes, but the best of pipes are made only from premium briar," says Al (see sidebar on briar, page 41). "It has tight fibers, beautiful grain, and gives a smooth, pleasing smoke."


A chunk of that briar about 1½" wide and 2" long (height varies due to burl irregularity) costs Al \$7.50 buying wholesale from a major importer. Larger sizes cost more. And, Al counts on about a 25 percent loss due to hidden flaws in the burl.

"Root burl has a tendency to grow up and around dirt, sand, and small rocks," he says. "So, sometimes I'll be carving what looks to be a perfectly good piece of briar and hit a grain of sand. Surface pits can be filled with a little briar dust and epoxy. When I find a flaw that channels right toward the bowl, I have to throw it away."

Former ad man Al Baier, left, loves to smoke Kentucky burley, his favorite tobacco, in a briar pipe. And for about the last decade, he has packed tobacco into nothing but his own hand-carved models. Now retired from his Boston business, Al, 65, lives with Ginny, his wife, in Manchester Center, Vermont.

Within view of his pipe-carving workshop, a trout stream bubbles its way beneath a wooden footbridge. Al glances at it often as he crafts briar into pipes collectors clamor for. His active retirement has become Utopia, "I carve functional things I really appreciate in a setting I used to dream about."

◀ "Make a pipe. You don't need many tools," says Al Baier.



Briar lasts a lifetime with moderate care, although it actually burns a little during each smoke. As the briar burns, carbon forms in the bowl, providing insulation. "You must scrape inside the bowl periodically to keep the carbon to the thickness of a dime," the veteran pipe smoker advises. "Too much carbon, it won't smoke right; too little, the bowl burns through."

PROMOTING AMERICAN HAND-CARVED PIPES

"Ninety-five percent of all pipes are made in Europe, mostly by machine," says the pipe carver. "For awhile, Denmark was producing some handmade pipes, but I don't see them marketed." And that fact, Al believes, spells O-P-P-O-R-T-U-N-I-T-Y for any carver willing to take on briar.

"My marketing instinct tells me to get a group of American pipe carvers together," Al says. "The timing is right: The American dollar is down, so pipes coming from Europe cost more and more. The opportunity's here, there's a market, and, it's fun to do!"

UP IN SMOKE

THE STEM, SHANK, SHOULDER, AND STUMMEL

Pipes all have similar parts, as shown in the drawing, right. However, all similarity ends there.

Among manufactured pipes, smokers distinguish between straight and bent stems as well as two dozen or more pipe-head shapes. Handcrafted pipes, on the other hand, have one-of-a-kind shapes. Among pipe smokers and collectors they're called *freehand* pipes. Imagination and skill are the only limits.

Sculptural, freehand pipes sell for a great deal more than standard, machine-made pipes. "On the average, I'm getting about \$175 for one of my pipes," Al explains, "although I do have more expensive ones. Most machine-made pipes sell from \$15 to \$55. That's where most new pipe smokers start. Then, they discover the beauty of handmade pipes."

THE CRITICAL CONFLUENCE

The briar Al buys comes in misshapen chunks rather than blocks. So, he cuts them to rough rectangular shape on a band saw. "Grain direction really doesn't make any difference," Al advises, "since it swirls all around anyway."

According to Al, boring the holes can be a ticklish operation. "The big thing is that the air hole has to emerge exactly at the bottom of the tobacco hole. If it's off, you get inferior combustion and an inferior smoke. Anyhow, I wasted many a block of briar."



To mark the position of the tobacco hole, he draws bisecting lines on the top of the briar. On the side of the briar about 90° from the tobacco hole, he marks the location for the air hole. Al cautions: "The two holes don't have to be exactly 90° apart, but they must meet squarely."

At the drill press, Al bores the tobacco hole with a $\frac{7}{8}$ " spade bit. Depending on the size of the


piece of briar, the hole will be either $1\frac{1}{2}$ " or $1\frac{3}{4}$ " deep. To round out the bottom of the tobacco hole—"it makes for better combustion"—he switches to another $\frac{7}{8}$ " spade bit which he ground to a rounded shape. For the air hole, Al calls on a $\frac{5}{32}$ " bit. Finally, he bores a mortise for the stem tenon by centering a $\frac{5}{16}$ " bit squarely on the air hole.

"Now, draw a pencil line to the rough shape you want your pipe to be and carve, chip, or hack away the briar with any tool you have," Al says. "When the wood gets down to the rough shape, you're ready for detailed carving.


There's a secret to that. Al learned it the hard way, with his first pipe he carved from a kit that included a stem and a predrilled briar block.

PASS THE VINEGAR, PLEASE

"I was using all my conventional carving tools—even a mallet and chisel—to try and carve the briar down," he recalls, bouncing a marblelike briar block on the table. Clunk. "In my haste to carve I had completely overlooked one tip in the instructions."

"That was, after you have done your rough carving, dunk that pipe in vinegar (white, 5% acid vinegar works best) and let it soak at least overnight! Then, carve it wet, right from the vinegar, and don't let it dry out until after the carving is done."

In shaping the pipe, Al always maintains a $\frac{3}{8}$ " wall thickness to keep the pipe from burning through in less than a lifetime. He notes, "To guide me, I bore a shallow circular mortise $\frac{3}{8}$ " around

the outside of the bowl with a circle cutter. The thickness of the shank doesn't matter, except that it has to be sturdy."

For much of the finish carving, Al depends on assorted riffler files. Sanding begins with 100-grit rather than 80-grit paper to avoid deeply scratching the bowl. Prior to the final sanding, he colors the briar with an alcohol-based aniline dye. "Some people prefer a natural finish, though," he notes, "because in use, the pipe grows darker with oil from the hands."

For a high luster on his pipes, Al finish-sands with 180-grit, then 220-grit paper, followed by 320-grit paper dry, then 400-grit wet. At the buffing wheel, he dabs on some tripoli, an abrasive compound, and polishes the pipe until he's satisfied.

PIPE LORE: THE LEGEND OF BRIAR

"In 1857," says Al, nestling into his easy chair, ever-present pipe in hand, "a French nobleman was traveling through the southernmost part of his country's Jura Mountains. In a small village called Saint-Claude, he settled down for a meal and the enjoyment of his favorite Turkish meerschaum pipe. But, he broke the brittle bowl!"

"As it turned out," Al continues, "a local woodcarver happened to have a chunk of aged root burl from the white heath tree [*Erica arborea*], a woody shrub that grows in harsh, rocky soil. It took the carver all night to carve a pipe from the rocklike wood. After trying the new pipe," Al puffs for emphasis, "the elegant Frenchman thought it far superior to his old meerschaum.

From that day on, briar's fame spread—first throughout France, then all of Europe.

"Today, 90 percent of all pipes are made of briar. And, the village of Saint-Claude calls itself the world's briar-pipe capital."

Briar destined for the world's finest pipes still comes from the mountain country around the Mediterranean Sea in France, Italy, Greece, Spain, and the islands of Corsica and Sicily. In these countries, diggers unearth the root burls and deliver them to the mills. There, saws cut the largest part of the burls into blocks called *ébauchons*. Blocks sawn from the upper and outer layer of the burl—distinguished by a pebble-textured "skin"—are named *plateaux*, and command top dollar.

INLAY

Thousands of years ago, artisans inlaid tombs of Egyptian Pharaohs with precious metals and jewels. In the centuries since then, skilled craftsmen have refined the process of inlaying veneers into their finest woodwork. Now, with the help of power tools, modern adhesives, and high-quality veneers, you can achieve similar results in your own workshop. Take, for example, the serving tray project on page 48. We think its floral inlay makes a big difference in the overall quality of the piece.

Though most woodworkers have never tried inlaying, we found it to be a fairly straightforward technique that's well within most everyone's capabilities. We'll show you how to make and install your own inlay designs, and give you some tips for working with pre-made inlays and bandings, as well. (See the Buying Guide on page 47 for our source of these products.)

You probably already have several of the tools required to do inlay projects. You'll need an X-acto knife for cutting veneer pieces of the inlay; a router to create an inlay recess; small hand-router plane

for cleaning up the recess; gap-filling cyanoacrylate (instant) glue that enables you to join the segments that make up the inlay; and two-faced cellophane tape for holding the segments in place. (See the Buying Guide on page 47 for our source of instant glue.)

One important note before you choose your materials: We recommend that you set both inlays and bandings into plywood or another stable material. If you use a solid wood as a base for an inlay, you run the risk of waking up some morning and finding that your inlay has buckled or cracked.

INTARSIA—WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Together, inlay, marquetry, and parquetry make up a form of wood decoration called *intarsia*. Often used interchangeably to describe similar techniques, it's no wonder these terms have a lot of us confused.

Inlay entails cutting a recessed shape into a wood surface and laying an image made of thin pieces of wood *into* the resulting recess. With *marquetry*, you create an image from thin pieces of wood and adhere that image *onto* a wood surface.

On the other hand, you lay *parquetry* *into* or *onto* a surface. It differs from inlay in that you always deal with straight lines and/or geometric shapes.

HOW TO MAKE AND

Once you master a few basic techniques, customizing a project with an inlay pattern of your own design can be rewarding and fun, allowing you to create with wood veneers almost anything you can imagine. Keep in mind, though, that the time and skill level necessary to complete an inlay project increases with the number and intricacy of parts in the design. You may want to start with a simple design, such as the balloon we use as our example in this article, or with one of the three other free patterns we offer on page 46.

PREPARING THE PATTERN

If you're making your own design, draw the pattern with dark ink on white bond paper, so the pen marks show through the paper from its back side. With your full-sized pattern in hand, number each segment of the pattern to organize your work. Now, select the grain direction for each segment by considering the way color would flow in that object in its natural state. Then, draw two lines on each pattern segment showing the best grain direction. If the pattern has more than a dozen segments, you may want to note the wood species on each segment.

Since you'll need two copies of this pattern, one for cutting out segments of the inlay from veneer, and the other for assembly of the inlay, you can now make a second copy of the pattern. Next, lay butted strips of double-faced cellophane tape over the image area

Recently, we took a fresh look at this time-honored woodworking technique in our shop and came away with some nifty new ways of doing things. To get you started, we'll go through the basic process, and even give you several free patterns, including the flying geese and balloon inlays shown here. In no time, you'll be ready to take flight with designs of your own making.

INSTALL YOUR OWN PATTERNS

of each copy. Designate either one of the patterns as the assembly copy, and attach it to a hard, smooth work surface (such as hardboard) with masking tape.

Lay a sheet of waxed paper over the entire taped area of the other pattern. With an X-acto knife, cut around the perimeter of the design, then cut apart each of the segments as shown *below*. Take your time; inlays turn out best when you exercise patience.



Cut apart all the segments of the cutting copy with an X-acto knife before attaching them to veneer. We put the veneer pieces together on the assembly copy, *top*.

CUTTING THE VENEER PIECES

Unless you have some veneer left over from a previous project, you'll need to order some. The sources on page 47 carry a full selection of species, plus dyed veneers in a rainbow of colors. Stay away from the $\frac{1}{64}$ "-thick flexible veneer, though; it's too thin for inlay. Most veneers will arrive flat enough to work with; however, burl and crotch pieces will almost always be wavy. To flatten veneer, use the procedure described in the box *below*.

With the veneer ready, peel the waxed paper from one segment, and look for a section of the veneer with interesting grain pattern. Then turn the veneer for best grain direction and lay the segment sticky-side down on the veneer. You should be able to see the segment number and grain marks (they'll be reversed) through the paper.

Carefully cut around the edges of the segment with a sharp X-acto knife as shown at *right*, making several passes

if necessary. Cut the end grain first to minimize splintering. Do not rush through this stage—your accuracy here determines how well the inlay will fit together.



Pull the X-acto knife away from the corners of a segment to prevent the veneer from splintering.



HOW TO TAKE THE WAVE OUT OF WAVY VENEER

To flatten veneer, start by mixing a solution of 2 ounces of pure glycerin (available from drugstores) in one quart of water. Lightly sponge or mist the solution onto one side of the veneer—do not soak it. Immediately place the veneer between sheets of kraft paper (from brown grocery


bags), and place this assembly between two pieces of plywood. Clamp this sandwich and let it sit until the veneer dries completely (normally about 2–3 days). You'll have to change the kraft paper at least once a day to speed along the drying process.

INLAY

ASSEMBLE THE INLAY

As you cut the veneer pieces, place them paper-side down on the assembly copy, and butt them tightly together as shown *below*.



Accurately cutting the veneer segments will guarantee a close-fitting inlay on the assembly copy.


You may find after assembling much of the inlay that the shape of some segments will need modification to fit the already-assembled veneer pieces around it. In this case, cut out the assembly copy segment by following the contour of the inlay pieces, as we

did in the photo *below left*, rather than the pattern lines. Then, apply that segment to the veneer so you can cut a perfect-fitting piece. When you return the piece to the assembly copy it will not stick, of course, but this won't be a problem as long as you keep this practice to a minimum.

With all the veneer pieces in place on the assembly copy, tack them together with gap-filling instant glue at the points where they tightly butt together as shown at *right*. Filling the crevices between pieces will detract from the final look of the inlay, so avoid this if possible. Do not spray the instant glue with "accelerator" to speed drying—the glue may bubble and turn white.

After the glue completely dries (2–3 minutes), run an X-acto knife along the outside edge of the inlay to cut it away from the assembly copy. If any veneer pieces form a ragged outside border where they join, cut the veneer away as necessary to make a smooth edge all around the inlay.


Now, gently peel away the pattern from its back side as shown at *right*. At this point you should have an assembled inlay ready to be set into a recess.



Save for last the segments that adjoin the greatest number of pieces. To get a tight fit for these segments, cut out the assembly copy piece, and cut the veneer directly from it.




Gap-filling instant glue holds the inlay pieces together.



Carefully peel away the pattern materials from the inlay. If the pattern sticks, gently lift it away with an X-acto knife.

HOW TO WORK WITH PREMADE INLAYS





CUTTING A RECESS FOR YOUR INLAY


To create a recess, first apply small strips of double-faced tape along the edge of its back side, with only $\frac{1}{8}$ " of the tape extending into the inlay. Now, position the inlay tape-side down on the plywood surface. Then, cut straight down with an X-acto knife to a depth that's at least the thickness of the inlay as shown *above left*.

After cutting all around the inlay, gently lift it from the surface and peel away the tape. With an X-acto knife, make a second cut at a 45° angle on the inside of the first cut (see illustration *below left*). The second cut defines the border of the recess, and makes for easier routing of the recess.

Next, remove the material within these cuts. Start by finding a straight router bit of a diameter that allows routing into the narrow sections of the pattern. For our example, we used a $\frac{1}{4}$ " bit.

Set the bit for the approximate thickness of the inlay, then make a test cut on scrap stock. Check the inlay against the test cut, and adjust the router until the depth of cut allows the inlay to stick just slightly above the surface (see illustration *above right*). With the


Be careful not to cut the plywood surface outside the edge of the inlay when you make the first cut—you can't disguise those cuts later.



Make the first cut straight down into the plywood. Hold the knife at a 45° angle for the second cut.

If you don't have the time to make your own inlays, you can buy premade inlays such as those shown at *right* from the sources on page 47. You can inlay these in much the same way we've described, but keep these differences in mind:

► **Avoid the temptation to bend and crack away the extra material around premade inlays. An X-acto knife will help you cut away the excess while keeping the inlay intact.**



Test the depth of the router's cut in scrap stock before making the recess.

depth set, clamp the plywood stock, lower the turning bit into the recess area, carefully rout along the edges first as shown *below*, and then rout away the material in the center.



Rout along the outline of the recess first, and then remove the center.

You will not be able to remove all the necessary material with a router. But you can clean up leftover material with a chisel, or

Continued

- Many premade inlays have excess wood surrounding the pattern, so cut it away with an X-acto knife. When making these cuts, pull away from fine points in


the inlay as shown at *left*. Then, follow the steps *above* for cutting the inlay's recess.

- You also glue and clamp the inlay as described on page 46, but make sure you place the inlay in the recess with its paper backing facing up.

better yet, with a router plane. The router plane shown *below*, or Stanley router plane #271, costs about \$16 and can be ordered from Constantine's (see page 47 for details). Now, check the size of the recess by dry-fitting the inlay; enlarge the recess as necessary with your X-acto knife.




Use a router plane to remove excess material from spots too tight for a motorized router.

CLAMPING AND PATCHING: THE FINISHING TOUCHES

After completing the recess, assemble the materials necessary to fasten the inlay into the recess. You'll need woodworker's glue, two pieces of particleboard (each large enough to cover the inlay completely), cardboard, waxed paper, and at least four C-clamps or handscrew clamps.

Apply a thin layer of woodworker's glue to the back side of the inlay and onto the surface of the recess. We used a toothpick to work glue into narrow spots. Now, place the inlay in the recess



and clamp it as illustrated *below left*. The cardboard layer allows the clamping pressure to conform to the irregular surface of the inlay. Position the clamps for even pressure and tighten securely.

Remove the inlaid piece after 30 minutes of clamping—enough time for the glue to skin over. The glue will be sufficiently soft that you can use an X-acto knife to scrape away the excess glue that has squeezed between the crevices of the inlay. If left in those crevices, the glue will appear white when dry; removing it promptly allows you to later color the crevice with wood putty.

Now, reclamp the inlay, using a fresh piece of waxed paper. Let it sit at least six hours.

Remove your project, and lightly sand the inlay flush with the plywood surface with 100-grit sandpaper. To ensure a flush surface, use a sanding block at least twice as long as the inlay. Be careful not to sand through the inlay. To fill the crevices, you'll need a putty knife and several colors of wood putty. Fill crevices along the outside of the inlay with a putty that matches the surrounding plywood. For crevices on the inside of the inlay, use a color matching the darkest adjacent segment. Apply the putty as shown *below*. Allow it to dry, then sand the inlay with 150-grit sandpaper.



To blend in the inevitable crevices, firmly press wood putties matching the surrounding wood into each one.



GET AN EDGE ON YOUR PROJECT WITH BANDINGS

After a little practice, we think you'll find installing bandings easy and fun. You can buy many different bandings (see a few at right), in lengths of 36", and in widths from $\frac{1}{16}$ " to $1\frac{1}{8}$ ". For this technique you'll need a router, sharp chisel, combination square, X-acto knife, and woodworker's glue.

MAKING A RECESS FOR THE BANDING

Like inlays, bandings sit in a recess slightly less deep than the thickness of the banding. To make the recess, first select a straight router bit the same width as your banding. If you don't have one the exact size, choose your next smallest. For example, for a banding just slightly over $\frac{3}{8}$ " wide, make a $\frac{3}{8}$ "-wide recess and then enlarge it about $\frac{1}{16}$ " by making a second pass with the same bit. Before cutting into your work piece, make a test recess on scrap stock.


Next, lay out the position of the banding on your stock with faint pencil lines. Draw the outside edge of the banding all the way around your stock, allowing the lines to overlap in the corners.

Using either the router's edge guide or a fence clamped to your stock, line up the router bit to follow your layout line. With the edge guide or fence set, start the router's left-to-right cut in any corner as shown *top right*. If you own a plunge router, plunge the bit down, rout to the next corner, then let the bit spring back up. For fixed-base routers, make sure you tilt the bit into the stock in a motion parallel to the layout line.


After completing the routing, you'll have to square the rounded outside corners of the recess. Start by aligning a chisel (it should be at least twice as wide as the banding you're using to assure a cut that's parallel to the recess) in a



A plunge router equipped with an edge guide simplifies cutting the recess, but fixed base routers and fences will work just as well.



To miter the banding, align it and a combination square with the edge of a piece of scrap stock, and follow the square's blade with an X-acto knife.



Use a chisel, with its bevel facing the recess, to remove excess corner material in a line parallel to the recess.

straight line with the outside edge of the recess as shown *above*. With the chisel's edge to the corner (and not beyond), strike it with a mallet to the depth of the recess. Repeat for the other side of the corner and lift out the excess material with the chisel.

CUTTING AND INLAYING THE BANDING

For a pleasing effect, miter the banding so its pattern aligns as much as possible in the corners. First, measure the outside dimen-

sion of the recess, then use a combination square, scrap stock, masking tape, and X-acto knife as shown *above* to miter the banding to length.

Before gluing any banding in place, you should first cut and dry-fit each piece, one at a time. Start on any side and work all the way around the border.

Once you're satisfied that the bandings fit well, you can gently pry them out with an X-acto knife. Lay them on the stock near their respective recesses so you don't get them mixed up, and apply a layer of woodworker's glue to the bottom of the recess. Now, reinsert the bandings and proceed with clamping and finishing as we did with inlays under the section "Clamping and Patching: The Finishing Touches" on page 46.

You'll need some $\frac{1}{2}$ " oak stock for this project. You can either resaw or plane stock to the correct thickness.

START WITH THE TRAY ENDS


1 Cut two pieces of $\frac{1}{2}$ "-thick oak to $3\frac{1}{4}$ " wide by $11\frac{7}{8}$ " long for the tray ends (A). (We planed $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick oak

to $\frac{1}{2}$ " thick.) Using the setup shown below left, bevel-rip the bottom edge of each tray end at 18° .

2 With the edges and ends flush, and the bevels facing out, stick the two end pieces together face to face with double-faced tape. (For reference, see the Bevel Detail accompanying Step 1 of the drawing titled "Miter-Cut the Tray Ends.")

3 Using carbon paper, transfer the full-sized half-pattern handle outline, opening, and center points for the $\frac{3}{4}$ " handle-hole opening shown at right to a sheet of white paper. (We've found that heavy paper or thin cardboard works best for templates.) Or, photocopy the pattern. Now, cut the half-pattern template to shape (don't cut the handle opening, though).


4 Using the template, carefully trace the half-pattern outline onto







the taped-together tray ends. You'll have to use the template twice to mark both halves of the outline onto the top tray end. Using an awl, poke through the template to transfer the 3/4" handle-hole center points to the top tray end. Set the template aside for now.


5 Set your miter gauge 18° from center, and trim one end of the taped-together tray end pieces where shown in Step 1 on the drawing at left.

6 Using a square, transfer the remaining cutline to the opposite face of the taped-together pieces. Now, where shown in Step 2, miter-cut the other end.

7 Drill a pair of $\frac{3}{4}$ " holes through the taped-together pieces where indented to form the ends of the handle opening. (When drilling, we used a brad-point bit and backed the tray ends with scrap stock to prevent chip-out.)


8 Cut the handle opening in the template to shape. Trace the opening outline onto the top tray end, aligning the ends of the handle opening with the $\frac{3}{4}$ " holes. Now, using a jig saw or scroll saw, cut the handle opening to shape. With a small sanding drum or sandpaper wrapped around a $\frac{1}{2}$ " dowel, sand the handle opening smooth.

9 Cut the arched top of the taped-together tray ends to shape. Sand the arched top smooth to remove the saw marks.

10 With the tray ends still taped together, rout a $\frac{1}{4}$ " round-over on the exposed face of each handle opening. (We routed the pieces on our router table.) Separate the pieces and remove the tape. Remove any sticky residue with thinner. Set the tray ends aside for now.

NOW, FASHION THE TRAY SIDES

1 Cut two pieces of $\frac{1}{2}$ "-thick oak to 2" wide by 18" long for the tray sides (B). Using the setup shown below, bevel-rip the bottom edge of each tray side at 18° .



2 Tilt the blade on your table saw 6° left of vertical. Also, set your table saw miter gauge 18° left of center (see Step 1 on the drawing at right for reference). With the previously cut bevel facing up and against the miter gauge, miter-cut one end of each tray side.

3 Attach an auxiliary fence to the miter gauge. Reset the miter gauge

to 18° right of center where shown in Step 2. Next, clamp a stop block in position, and trim the opposite end of each tray end to a $16\frac{1}{2}$ " finished length.

4 Sand the ends (A) and sides (B).

ASSEMBLE THE TRAY FRAME

1 Mix epoxy and apply to the mating edges—see the Buying Guide on the opposite page for our source of epoxy. As shown in the photo below, tape the frame joints tightly together with the bottom edges of the sides flush with the bottom edges of the ends. Check for square. Wipe off any excess epoxy. (Due to the difficulty in clamping angled joints, we used epoxy which requires only that the joints be held together flush.)

2 After the epoxy has cured, remove the tape, scrape off any ex-

cess epoxy, and sand the joints smooth. Sand the top edges of the tray sides flush with the top edges of the tray ends.

3 Mark the center points of the $\frac{1}{4}$ " dowel holes at each corner of the tray. (See the full-sized Half Pattern for hole locations.) Now, as




Clamp the tray frame to a work surface, and drill the $\frac{1}{4}$ " dowel holes.



Tape the epoxied corner joints together tightly. Check that the bottom edges are flush and that the tray frame is square.

MITER-CUT THE TRAY SIDES



shown in the photo at left, clamp the tray frame to the top of your workbench, and drill $\frac{1}{4}$ " holes 1" deep where marked.

4 From $\frac{1}{4}$ " dowel stock, cut eight $1\frac{1}{4}$ "-long dowels for strengthening the corner joints. Wipe glue in the holes, and dowel the corner joints. Later, trim the dowels flush with the outside face of the tray (we used yellow woodworker's glue, and trimmed the dowels flush with a dovetail saw).

5 Chuck a $\frac{1}{4}$ " rabbet bit into your table-mounted router. Raise the bit $\frac{1}{4}$ " above the surface of the router table. Then, rout a $\frac{1}{4}$ " rabbet along the bottom inside edge of the tray as shown in the photo below.



Rout a $\frac{1}{4}$ " rabbet $\frac{1}{4}$ " deep along the bottom inside edge of the frame.

ADD THE BOTTOM


1 Measure the rabbeted opening, and cut the tray bottom (C) to size from $\frac{1}{4}$ " oak plywood. Now, position the tray frame squarely over the tray bottom, and trace the rounded corners onto the tray bottom. Cut and sand the radiused corners to shape.

2 Referring to the inlay-techniques article starting on page 42 and the full-sized flower and leaf pattern above right, cut and install the inlay pattern into the top center of the $\frac{1}{4}$ " oak plywood. (See the Buy-

ing Guide at right for our source of walnut, holly, and mahogany veneer for the pattern.)

3 Sand the finished tray bottom smooth, being extremely careful not to sand through the thin-veneer inlay pattern.

4 Using woodworker's glue and spring clamps, glue and clamp the plywood bottom into the rabbeted opening in the tray bottom. Remove any excess glue immediately with a damp cloth. Sand the bottom of the tray frame flush with the bottom of the tray bottom.

SAND AND FINISH

1 Finish-sand the assembled tray. **2** Apply the finish. (We left our tray unstained, and brushed on three coats of polyurethane.)



WOODEN BOATS

WOODWORKING WITH ALL THE ANGLES



With a perseverance common to boatbuilders, three San Diego-area woodworkers keep a seafaring tradition afloat.

Many of the venerable ways of the shipwright—the craftsman charged with framing and planking merchant vessels and men-of-war—vanished in the 1800s along with the days of commercial sailing. But, metal, plastic, and fiberglass haven't sunk the wooden boat.

Today's nautical craftsmen have adopted contemporary wood products, materials, and hi-tech adhesives. They have also learned new techniques to couple with time-honored know-how to preserve the boatbuilding heritage.



"I love to build boats because of the type of woodworking involved. Everything is compound angles, compound curves. You can do a great deal without using levels and squares. You use your eyes."

Sam Radding, San Diego

Passersby just sort of drop in on Sam Radding when he's building boats. His two-car garage workshop under an apartment faces side-street traffic. The interruptions aren't nagging, according to Sam, "If I was building boats down by the docks, boat owners would pester me to fix something."

Besides, who knows when a drop-in may buy Sam's 16' wooden sailboat. He makes one

boat at a time, and sells them for up to \$10,000.

Joy in the shop

Sam, 41, once specialized in guitars and dulcimers, but now can't think of a thing he'd rather build than a boat. "Building a simple boat is a joy in itself. When you add things like a teak transom, carving, the little cabin, then it becomes fine furniture," he says.

Of his own design, the nearly completed vessel fits his description. "Look at any part of the boat—it all blends. I don't build boats that I wouldn't want to sail."

To perfect the lines, Sam relies on drawings and templates. "I'll take a scrap piece of wood and make a model of the part, and if it needs to be changed, I'll change it until it fits."

Design dictates materials

Despite his design instinct, Sam is a woodworking realist. He knows high-priced small sailboats wouldn't sell. And materials raise prices. "I'm not a purist, though. If a design lends itself to exterior-grade plywood rather than the much more expensive marine plywood, make it out of exterior grade! This particular boat lends itself to exterior-grade-plywood-and-fiberglass construction—the sides are flat and it has a relatively flat bottom. Exterior-grade plywood works great if you fill the voids and protect it from moisture with epoxy."

WOODEN BOATS

“When I lived in Idaho, a New England friend saw a photo of me and sent a note: ‘Boatbuilders in Boise look like those in Maine—poor and happy.’ As a boatbuilder I’ve never been poorer, yet I’ve never been happier.”

Art Hoban, Vista

In his early forties, Art Hoban looks like he could play pro soccer, or on a whim, go climb the Andes. He's in great physical shape for either. First, though, he'll row one of his open boats down the Sea of Cortez to Mazatlán, Mexico. Or, he'll find a companion and set out around the world in his 18' sailboat. Art loves water intensely, and builds cold-molded wooden boats to ply it. He pours his creativity into sailboats and the craft he calls “wherries.”

“Wherries are related to the racing scull,” he says. Art’s recreational row boats, though, aren’t as high-tech as racing sculls. His boats withstand rough water and owner abuse. “Sculls are 12” wide, 24’ long—real stilettos. Hit a ripple, though, they’re in trouble!” Art exclaims. “My single boats (for one person) are 16’ long, 39” wide. The doubles run 24’ and 48” wide. They have keels. They get dragged, dropped, rammed, and rolled.”

In the last eight years, Art has built 20 single wherries. He sold one of his early ones to Jim Whittaker, the first American to climb Mt. Everest. Art isn’t getting wealthy at the \$2,500 each he asks for them. And, he won’t sell plans. Building them himself is the only way to maintain quality control over the hulls.

The 24’ double may still be in the trial stage. “With this particular boat, I was working only from an idea, so I spent a lot of time looking like Rodin’s statue, *The Thinker*. ”

Laying up a cold-mold hull

For strength, durability, and lightness in his boats, Art mastered the cold-mold process perfected by



Michigan’s boat-building Gougeon brothers. It begins with wood. “I rip $\frac{1}{8}$ ”-thick western red cedar that I get from Oregon into strips 4” wide, which I call planks.

“Then, in essence, this is what happens,” Art goes on (see drawing, *above right*). “I have a plywood-framed, wood-mold hull covered with sheet plastic that acts as a mold release. I make the stem and keel from laminated mahogany, and rabbet the keel on each side to accept the cedar planks, and set it over the mold hull. Then, I lay the first layer of strips at 45° coming aft, toward the stern. Next, I put down epoxy for the second layer that goes forward at 45°. Staples hold it in place until the epoxy dries. After I pull the staples, another layer of epoxy goes down for the third layer, which overlaps joints of the first two layers and comes back aft,” he notes. “After the staples come out, I have a shell.


“When I pop it off the mold, I have triple-diagonal planking bonded with epoxy—no fasteners. That makes an incredibly strong hull that’s only $\frac{3}{8}$ ” thick,” Art continues. “On the inside and outside of the hull, I use a lightweight fiberglass cloth with three coats of epoxy resin over it as a sealer. Then, I rough it up on the inside and give it three coats of varnish. On the outside, I paint. That’s all for UV protection. The 16’ single comes off the mold at 40 pounds.”

Rather than one big future dream project in the back of his mind, Art has a constant stream. “My dream boats are an ongoing thing,” he explains. “As soon as I finish one, there’s another one to build.”

Art Mulvey and his dad, Art Sr., represent a boatbuilding tradition. Art Sr. began building straightforward, simple, seaworthy wooden boats of New England design in the 1950s. He still builds them in his Hope, Rhode Island, shop. Art, Jr., 33, started there in high school, but now works cross-continent in Oceanside. In his garage, he builds 8' blunt-nosed, flat-bottomed boats called prams, lightweight 10-14' sailing/rowing boats referred to as skiffs, and 21' outboard-powered, high-sided skiffs termed dories.

Tradition meets technology

Young Art believes in following the old, time-tested designs, with some modification. "All the designs have pretty much been passed down through the generations," Art explains. "But I change them just a little by giving them more width for greater stability and capacity."

For instance, my 21' dory measures about 7' across the beam."

While adhering to classic design, Art incorporates up-to-date materials and methods. For instance, he rips the planks for his lapstrake boats—such as the 14', made-to-order, \$3,500 skiff shown—from a special multi-ply marine plywood called Bruynzeel African mahogany. He then bevels the planks to fit and fastens them to stout oak ribs—sometimes with only epoxy. "I use a saturating epoxy, brushed on both sides, that adheres the planks to the frame," Art says. "That way I don't have to use screws or other fasteners." A layer of fiberglass on the plywood bottom and a coat of epoxy make a watertight boat.

Three coats of spar varnish over the epoxy base equals the depth of 10 coats of varnish, according to Art. "The epoxy gives it body and it creates an easily maintained finish (see photo, above)."

Custom cabinetry, furniture, and boat repair fill the gaps between Art's boats—and despite the differences, he likes them all equally. "With a boat, when you come to a part or section, you have to stop, figure it, and work it out—you have to fit it," he comments. "When you do both cabinets and boats, you have to learn two different ways of thinking."

VACUUMS

THEY'LL CLEAN UP

If you were embarrassed to show off your shop the last time friends dropped by, maybe you should consider a shop vacuum to simplify cleanup chores.

Incredibly versatile, today's wet/dry shop vacuums can pick up water as well as sawdust, dirt, nails...you name it. In fact, keeping the shop vacuum in your shop might be the only problem you have when other family members discover it.

Two companies dominate the shop-vacuum market: Shop-Vac Corporation and Sears. Shop-Vac manufactures a complete line of machines in its 3 U.S. and

Canadian plants, covering nearly every residential and commercial need. It also privately labels the machines sold by most of the other companies in the market. Emerson Electric makes Sears shop vacuums.


HOW SHOP VACUUMS WORK

Basically, all shop vacuums consist of little more than a motorized fan and a tank. When you flip the switch of one of these debris-gobbling machines, the fan blows filtered air out of the tank, creating a vacuum within the tank. At the same time, air rushes into the tank through the hose to fill this void, drawing debris with it. Heavier material drops to the bottom of the tank, and a filter traps the finer particles as they try to exit.


As you can see by the cutaway illustration *below*, dry-pickup-only

units draw filtered air directly through the motor—if a filter tears, dirty air will enter the motor housing and possibly damage it. Wet/dry units, on the other hand, have a bypass motor system, meaning the air drawn into the tank exits the tank without coming in contact with the motor (see illustration *below*). A small fan, completely separate from the blower, cools the motor.

Also, wet/dry machines have motors mounted on the outside of the

tank, protecting them from water within the tank. A float within the filter assembly rises with the water, sealing the opening between the tank and the fan housing.

To push air through one of these refuse-eaters, today's wet/dry vacuums have either one blower (single-stage) or two (two-stage). Two-stage shop vacuums (see illustration *below*) increase the lifting power of the shop vacuum because a larger blower first

brings in a volume of air, then a smaller blower pushes out the already-compressed air.


ARE THEY A SUBSTITUTE FOR A DUST COLLECTOR?

You can hook up shop vacuums to woodworking machinery such as a belt sander for dust removal, but they won't work for as long a continuous period as dust collectors. Shop vacuums use brush-type universal motors designed for intermittent duty, whereas dust collectors use continuous-duty induction motors.

Compared to shop vacuums, full-time dust collection systems will move a greater volume of air, but they won't pick up heavy materials such as nails or big wood chips. Because a shop vacuum moves a much smaller volume of air, you should only hook a vacuum up to one machine at a time.

Price-wise, shop vacuums range from \$30 to \$850 generally, but we found that models in the \$70 to \$140 range will perform well in most home shops. Portable dust collectors, on the other hand, will cost you at least \$200.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A VAC

SUCTION: THE #1 CONSIDERATION

Three factors determine the suction power of a vacuum: static pressure, volume flow rate, and the size of hose attached to the vacuum. Static pressure (sp) reflects the *lifting power* of a vacuum—a high sp rating means a machine will lift heavier material than a machine with a low sp number. Volume flow rate means the *amount of air* that a vacuum will move, expressed in cubic feet per minute (cfm). Hose size affects both sp and cfm. As a hose becomes longer and narrower, sp increases and cfm decreases.

The combination of these three factors determines the best use for a particular vacuum. For sawdust removal from operating machines, a vacuum must inhale a large volume of air at a fast rate, requiring a high cfm number (dust collectors have very high cfm numbers).

Because shop vacuums have to also lift heavy materials, such as water, nails, or metal shavings, they also have high sp ratings compared to a dust-collection system.

Even the least expensive models we looked at had high cfm numbers and will do a good job of dust removal. The cost of a vacuum climbs as its sp rating goes up, but if you want to pick up heavy materials in one pass, look for a vacuum with an sp rating of at least 50.

PLEATED OR DOUBLE FILTERS—WHAT'S BEST?

You'll find two designs of shop-vacuum filters: one-piece pleated paper cartridges, or double filters with a foam or cloth core and surrounded by a paper or cloth bag. The double filters clean easily, but because of relatively little surface area, will clog rapidly when picking up plaster or sanding dust.

Pleated paper cartridges, on the other hand, won't clog as readily because of their large surface area. However, once wet, they take a long time to dry, and any dust on them will dry to a solid crust. We

recommend a pleated filter for strictly in-the-shop use, where water is rarely picked up.



Because of greater surface area, pleated cartridges won't clog from fine dust as quickly as foam and paper filters.

THE NOISE FACTOR

There's no getting around it: Shop vacuums make a lot of noise. However, some models scream louder than others. To find out how much noise they make, we tested the 10 machines we brought in for this article with a decibel meter. The loudest bellowed forth 85 decibels (dB); the quietest came in at 76 dB (see the results in the chart on page 61). To our ears, 76 dB was acceptably noisy; 85 dB was loud and downright uncomfortable.

The Shop-Vac 984-02 and 900-60 (at 77 and 76 dB) were the quietest machines we tested, but both list price over \$400. Among models under \$150, the variable-power Sears 17921 was the only unit under 80 dB (79 dB at full power).

OTHER POINTS TO USE THE RIGHT HOSE FOR THE JOB

In the workshop, you'll need a 2½" hose for collecting sawdust off surfaces or directly from your machinery. Smaller hoses restrict air flow, thus reducing the quantity of dust extracted. Also, larger chips will be less likely to clog a 2½" hose. Finally, many stationary woodworking machines have 2½" dust ports. (Shop-Vac makes both 2½" to 1½" and 2½" to 1¼" hose adapters.)

For drawing up water, you'll need a 1¼" or 1½" hose. The smaller diameter creates the pressure necessary to lift liquids.

TANK CAPACITY AND CONSTRUCTION

Shop vacuums range in capacity from 5 to 55 gallons. If you'll be using a shop vacuum as a dust collection system for a surface planer, for example, you may be surprised at how fast a 10-gallon tank fills. Constantly emptying the tank can be a nuisance, but if you're using the vacuum in conjunction with a machine that produces a small amount of sawdust, such as a belt sander, a small tank will handle it.

Also, consider the material of a tank (fiber, plastic, steel, or stainless steel). Fiber (cardboard) containers, made for dry pickup only, range up to 28 gallons. They offer large capacity, low weight, and low price. Fiber containers puncture easily, however, and also will burn if a hot metal filing were to enter the tank and ignite sawdust or other debris. The material also will rot if exposed to damp conditions.

Plastic (the most common material for tanks) works well for water pickup, but may melt from heat or solvents. Its exterior also attracts a lot of dust through static electricity, making cleaning it a chore. On the plus side, it's lightweight, will not dent, and will last forever if not abused. All in all, we find plastic tanks to be the best option for the home wood shop.

CONSIDER BEFORE YOU BUY

Though it will not burn or melt, steel has the disadvantage of being heavier, and will rust if its protective coating is scratched. If dented near the rim, steel tanks will leak air, making the unit less efficient.

Stainless steel has the advantages of steel without the possibility of corrosion. It's also harder to dent, but will put a real dent in your wallet—you'll pay at least \$300 for a stainless-steel-tank vacuum.

ATTACHMENTS: LOTS TO CHOOSE FROM

For almost any vacuuming job, there's an attachment that will help—most types come in $1\frac{1}{4}$ ", $1\frac{1}{2}$ ", and $2\frac{1}{2}$ " sizes. Shop-Vac offers the most complete line of these attachments, but their add-ons will fit other makes as well. Lightweight plastic attachments work well, but may crack or melt. Their more-durable metal counterparts cost more. For the home workshop, plastic attachments should easily outlive the vacuum itself, making them the practical choice.

You'll find the attachments shown *below* will help you do most jobs. For vacuuming floors, or reaching high places, you'll need extension wands. Here are a few others you might find useful: squeegee nozzles for drawing up water, brush nozzles for floors, carpet nozzles, and crevice tools for tight spots. You'll find a small

round brush attachment invaluable for vacuuming sanded surfaces.

THE IMPORTANCE OF MOBILITY

Since a shop vacuum will likely see duty all around your home, make sure it can easily go where needed. Vacuums move about in two ways: on four small casters, or push carts with one or two casters in front and two fixed-axle wheels in back.

For average home shop use, you don't have to spend more than \$150 to get a shop vacuum that will efficiently handle nearly any job.

The caster units tend to wander as you pull them, but the push carts will move in a straight line when pulled because of their non-pivoting wheels. Also, their handles and large rear wheels enable you to easily move them up and down stairs. We suggest spending the extra money for a push cart only if you often move the vacuum up and down stairs.

WARRANTIES: SHOULD YOU BUY EXTENDED COVERAGE?

Genie, Sears, and Shop-Vac provide a one-year warranty with their products. Sears sells an optional

maintenance agreement that covers anything that could happen to the machine for two or three years. The price ranges from \$21–\$33 for each additional year of coverage up to two additional years, depending on your region, so check with your local store. Under the Sears plan, even if you run over your unit with a car, Sears will replace it free of charge. This plan covers filters (\$12.99 each), so if you often clean up fine dust or water, this route may make sense for you.

WHICH MODEL DO YOU NEED?

If you're interested purely in dust removal from your stationary machinery, a dust collector is your best bet. But if you would like a machine that can remove dust from one machine at a time, and clean your entire shop while performing service throughout your home, a shop vacuum is for you.

For average home shop use, you don't have to spend more than \$150 to get a shop vacuum that will efficiently handle nearly any job. Our recommendation: Buy a wet/dry machine (because of its bypass motor, even if you won't be picking up water) with a capacity of at least 15 gallons, and suction of at least 50 sp and 130 cfm. For attachments, consider these essential: a $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose, extension wands, crevice tool and floor nozzle.

HERE'S THE LOWDOWN ON THE 10 MODELS WE TESTED

Sears 17964

This machine (*foreground, right*) packs lots of suction, and creates less noise than the Sears vacuums of a few years ago. A hose port pointing horizontally from the blower housing, along with large handles, makes the machine convenient to use. One caution about the handles: Don't grab the tank-release catches inside them as you pick up the machine. If you do, the tank will fall to the floor.

Sears 17921

Plenty of power and two distinctive features make this unit (*background, right*) clean up on the competition in its price range. Its variable power control (labeled "variable speed") allows you to dial-down the suction and noise level, making the machine invaluable for working around thin veneers or small objects that might get sucked into a stronger-running vacuum. It also features a handy retractable cord.



Sears 17990

Sears' top vacuum has many features found only on the better Shop-Vac models, such as steel extension wands and aluminum attachments.

Assembling the cart proved to be difficult—there were lots of small parts and unclear instructions. Emerson Electric's Vicki Vanderford told us that they're developing a cart with 90 percent less parts and better instructions.



Shop-Vac 900-60

Like the Shop-Vac 984-02, here's another unit probably more at home in a convention center or hotel. Nevertheless, it has several features we'd like to see on workshop vacuums. A cloth bag fits around the rim of the tank and forms the first part of its filtration system. The bag can be shaken free of dust by just lifting a tab in its center, as shown on page 58. It was the quietest machine we tested (76 dB).



Shop-Vac 850-03

Standard features on this steel-tank model (*shown on left*) include 2½" and 1¼" hoses. Its loud (84dB) motor develops low suction (42 sp and 135 cfm).



Shop-Vac 464-38

Like the 850-03, it comes standard with hoses in both sizes. It's also one of Shop-Vac's least expensive two-stage models at \$249.95 list.

Genie PHD-1626

The Genie unit (*center, left*) that we tested drew plenty of air (140 cfm) considering its low price (\$109.95 list), but we did notice a few drawbacks. It didn't lift heavy materials (45 sp), and its thin, puncture-prone hose collapses under the slightest back pressure. We also found emptying the tank awkward because the hole in the top of the tank is smaller than the diameter of the tank.

Shop-Vac 984-02

Designed for general use rather than purely in the shop, this unit has a standard 1½" hose. It has strong static pressure (105 sp—thanks to its 3.5 peak hp two-stage motor), low noise, stainless steel tank, well-built accessories, and a price tag to match: \$854.95 list. We like its hose storage cage and curved wand that enables you to stand while vacuuming under objects.

Shop-Vac 634-00 and 411-01

Two key differences separate these otherwise-similar dry-pickup-only machines. First, the size of tank. The 634-00 (*shown on left*) can be purchased with a 55-gallon steel drum—the 411-01 has a 28-gallon fiber tank. Second, the number of motors (the 634-00 has two that run together or intermittently, the 411-01 has one). High tank capacity helps both of them do double-duty as dust collectors.

Walter had a slight problem building his 18×7×27" pine reproduction of an antique hunter's ammunition chest. "The stock for the doors is only 3/4" thick," he notes, "so I had about 1/4" of wood to carve in—going deeper would have warped the door."

Instead of carving that deep, he gave the impression of depth with design. The door has a large foreground at the lower right and progressively smaller and shallower figures toward the top left.

Because the doors extend 1/2" below the frame, Walter eliminated the need for pulls. Magnetic catches hold the doors tightly closed.

For contrast on the carved doors, he laid down walnut stain, then wiped it from the flat surfaces. He finished his cabinet with clear varnish. Walter, you sure hit the target!


PICK A PAIR OF CARVINGS

WORKING AROUND THE CLOCK

Jerry Duh, 34 • Indianapolis, Indiana • Firefighter

Two days off between 24-hour shifts at the fire station gave Jerry a timely advantage—plenty of concentrated hours to tackle a big project. And his replica of a 19th-century Vienna regulator clock turned out to be exactly that.

Jerry built the $12\frac{3}{4} \times 8 \times 42"$ clock from blueprints. Except for substituting red oak for the recommended wood, Jerry didn't deviate from the plans. None of the required woodworking tasks proved difficult, Jerry says, although he found the first-time reading of blueprints quite a challenge. "From a side view," Jerry notes, "a mortise and tenon become three lines."

Jerry's craftsmanship proved meticulous, though. His advice: "Go slowly."



TEACHER'S HOMEWORK

*Bill Badland, 63 • Morro Bay, California
Retired high school shop teacher*

Bill didn't teach woodturning in his school shop class—he saved it for homework. For this assignment, he alternated layers of walnut and cherry in a laminated turning block that eventually became this 14"-wide by 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ "-tall bowl.

Bill says he made the herringbone-patterned bottom much like a chess board: "I cut and alternately lined up $\frac{3}{4}$ " cherry and $\frac{1}{4}$ " walnut, then sliced through the strips at 45° angles, flipped over every other one, and laminated them." After finish-sanding, Bill wiped on tung oil, then paste wax.



FINISH A MILE DEEP

*Scott Hower, 35, and Dan Silknetter, 28
Millersville, Pennsylvania
Woodworkers*

At Scott and Dan's Mad River Redwoods Company, tables like this draw gasps. That's when their hand labor pays off. The woodworking duo personally select prime Northern California redwood specimens to slice into slabs with a chainsaw, then truck the chunks to their Pennsylvania shop.

Called "Nymph's Wing," the table shown measures $45 \times 25 \times 16"$. The 3"-thick top is redwood lace burl. Roots from a black locust tree form the base.

Scott and Dan accent features with a flexible disc grinder, chisels, rasps, wire brushes, and even flame. As many as 12 coats of Zar polyurethane followed by a final polishing with automotive buffing compound "produces a durable finish with the beauty of a French polish," they say.

FOUR CORNERSTONES

Despite the best intentions, more than 300,000 persons rush to hospital emergency rooms each year, victims of serious home workshop accidents. On top of that, says the National Safety Council, two to three times that number go unreported. We think these sobering statistics are reason enough to offer you a short shop safety review.

Teachers, experienced woodworkers—even your dad—no doubt passed along safety guidelines on numerous occasions. Our five safety experts spell them out again, because they're worth repeating, again and again.

RULE 1: KEEP A SHIPSHAPE SHOP

“Good workshop lighting is essential. Light fixtures should provide clear vision with a minimum of shadows in work areas and over machines.”

*Phil Schmidt, section head,
National Safety Council*

Besides adequate light, Schmidt advises you to set up your shop to allow ample space for your stationary tools. “There should be no danger of bumping into one machine while using another,” he says.

Minimize tripping, slipping, or falling by stowing idle tools and sweeping up around your machines every 30 minutes or so. To avoid cuts and splinters, clear saw tablespops of saw-

dust and scraps with a brush or shop vacuum, rather than your bare hands, suggests the NSC staff. And, store materials and parts out of the way.

Always turn off and unplug machines while adjusting them and changing blades or bits. But never unplug a power tool by giving the cord a jerk or drag a tool around by its cord. This eventually wears on the connection.



Make sure everything is electrically safe, too, the NSC says. All power tools should have three-pronged plugs, except double-insulated tools. And install ground-fault circuit interrupters (they may be required by your local electrical code). Finally, check for underpowered circuits overloaded by numerous power tools.

RULE 2: DRESS FOR WOODWORKING SUCCESS

“Watch those precious eyes—you have two for a lifetime!”

tools. And, you need a face mask for dust protection.”

Heber Anderson, Black & Decker's product training manager, says that “People have actually died by getting a tie caught and pulled into a lathe. So, dress appropriately. Avoid wearing loose clothing, long sleeves, jewelry, and gloves while working with power tools, particularly lathes and routers.”

“The sharp, spinning steel of a table saw, the grit of a sander, the wood bits from a lathe, dictate that you wear safety glasses or goggles that provide side protection with shields,” emphasizes Hemp. “Eye protection is always a must, even with most hand

Adds the NSC's Schmidt, “Keep long hair out of the way with a close-fitting cap or net. Shoes with rubber soles provide better support and protection from slipping, as well as from sharp objects on the floor. If there's a danger of heavy objects falling on your feet in your shop, wear industrial-type shoes with steel safety toes.”

Protect your hearing with disposable earplugs,

reusable earplugs, or cushioned muffs when you use power saws, jointers, or routers. Some routers, for instance, can exceed the 85-decibel threshold for hearing loss established by OSHA, the government's industrial safety watchdog. While you would have to endure that high pitch for several hours to sustain injury, with all the other noise you subject your ears to, why take chances?

OF SHOP SAFETY

RULE 3: RESPECT YOUR TOOLS

"If you get into a 40-tooth saw blade turning at 5,800 rpm, more than 1,288 teeth will pass through your hand before you can move it."

According to Anderson, vivid facts instill caution. "If everyone thought of that saw blade in terms of what all those teeth can do, they'd pay a table saw more respect," he says.

Overconfidence contributes to accidents, according to Anderson. "We see people who have handled tools all their lives become almost as dangerous as a

novice," he says very concernedly.

Delta's Humpy couldn't agree more. "Lack of respect for the machine, repetitive work, and working with the blade guard removed often result in a finger or hand in the blade."

Another Delta safety professional, Mat Ros, product safety manager, suggests ways to avoid potentially

nasty table-saw accidents:

- Leave the blade guard on when sawing.
- Use protective jigs, featherboards, and push sticks.
- Don't rip boards without clamping the rip fence.
- Avoid blade binding or kicking by only making crosscuts with the help of the miter gauge.
- Never reach around or over the blade.

Making tools do a job they weren't designed to do causes injuries, too. "For example," says Jim Elmore, Stanley Tool Division's manager of product safety, "people commonly use a screwdriver for a pry bar, and it can break."

Beware of dull cutting tools, too. A dull saw blade overheats, sticks, and kicks, more than a sharp one.

RULE 4: GIVE WOODWORKING YOUR ATTENTION



"When you're emotionally upset, let the tools lie. If you're overtired or feeling ill, don't try to work. These are commonsense things that people overlook sometimes for the sake of getting the project done," notes Elmore.

"Inattentiveness and distractions can lead to disaster," agrees the NSC's Schmidt. "Concentrate on

the task at hand and don't rush through it, even when you feel hurried."

To break up the monotony of making repetitive cuts, stop and do something else for awhile. Also, insist that no visitors disrupt you. In particular, keep small children out of your shop at all times, especially while you're busy working.

"The poor guy who's just had a spat with a family member and goes down into the basement to work in his shop is apt to do something the wrong way."



PUT A RAZOR-SHARP EDGE ON YOUR HAND SCRAPER

Craftsmen have long turned to the hand scraper to remove stock quickly while leaving an extra-smooth surface. A scraper can do wonders for you, too, if you sharpen it correctly. Here's how:



1 Whether you're sharpening a new scraper, or reviving a dull one, start by securing the scraper in a vise. File the scraper edge flat and square by stroking it 4–6 times with a metal-cutting file.



2 To smooth the edge, hold the scraper upright as shown, and pull it across a sharpening stone 4–6 times.



3 To remove the microscopic metal burrs that filing and smoothing create, lay the scraper flat, and draw it across the stone 4–6 times. Flip the scraper over and repeat. At this point, the edge should be smooth and square, as shown in the inset illustration. Return the scraper to the vise.



4 With a round-shanked screwdriver, or a special burnisher tool, held perpendicular to the clamped scraper's edge, firmly stroke the length of the scraper 2–3 times to begin forming the *burr* (the edge that actually does the cutting).



5 Next, with the burnisher tool at a slight angle, stroke the scraper's edges 2–3 more times. This increases the "hook angle" of the burr.



6 Repeat steps 1 through 5 for the edges of the scraper opposite those just sharpened. This time, however, hold the scraper in your hand. Clamping the scraper in a vise will dull the already-sharpened edges.




FULL-SIZED PATTERNS



CUTTING THE RINGS


With a compass, mark a $2\frac{3}{4}$ "-diameter circle on $\frac{1}{8}$ "-thick plywood for each ring required. Reset

the compass for a 3"-diameter circle. Now, using the same center point, mark a larger circle outside each smaller one.





HOLIDAY ORNAMENTS SILHOUETTES



Use a circle cutter chucked into your drill press to cut the inside of each plywood ring to shape.

2 Chuck a circle cutter into your drill press. Position the cutter where shown on the drawing (*far left*). As shown in the photo at *left*, clamp the plywood to the drill table, and position the circle-cutter bit directly over the center point used to mark the circles. Start the drill (we used a speed of about 250 rpm) and cut halfway through the plywood.


3 Flip the plywood over, center the bit over the hole just drilled, and

finish cutting through the plywood to form the inside of the ring. The two-step procedure minimizes chip-out.

4 Cut the outside of each ring to shape on a band saw or scroll saw, cutting just outside the marked line. Hand-sand to the line for finished shape (we used a sanding block with 150-grit paper).

5 Cut two pieces of $\frac{3}{4}$ " plywood to $5 \times 7"$, and construct the drilling jig shown on the next page.

SEASONAL SILHOUETTES

6 Clip the head off a 4d finish nail, and chuck the nail into the drill press. Start the drill, and sand or file the bottom $\frac{3}{8}$ " of the nail to $\frac{1}{16}$ " diameter. Most $\frac{1}{16}$ " bits are too small for a drill-press chuck. (We attached 60-grit sandpaper to a sanding block to shape the end of the nail.) Place a ring in the kerf in the jig, center the ring under the bit, and drill a $\frac{1}{16}$ " thread-access hole through each ring as shown in the photo below right.

SHAPING THE HOLIDAY FIGURES

1 Using carbon paper, trace the full-sized ornament patterns onto paper. Adhere the patterns to the $\frac{1}{8}$ " stock with spray adhesive.

2 Scroll-saw the figures to shape, and remove the patterns. If you have trouble removing the paper patterns, moisten them with thinner, and they'll peel right off.

Lightly sand each figure with 220-grit sandpaper.


3 With the 4d finish nail still chucked into your drill press, hold a wood figure upright in a handscrew clamp, and drill a $\frac{1}{8}$ "-deep hole.

Later, you'll insert thread into the hole for hanging. See the full-sized patterns for hole locations.

FINAL ASSEMBLY

1 Apply the finish of your choice. (For something this small, we prefer an aerosol finish such as a Deft or Flecto product.)


2 Run the thread through the hole in the ring. (We used a heavy-duty, gold-

colored cotton thread.) Place a dab of instant glue (cyanoacrylate) on the end of the thread inside the ring, and insert the thread into the hole in the top of the hardwood figure. Move the thread up and down to center the figure in the ring. Once properly positioned, put a dab of instant glue on the thread where it goes through the plywood ring.

A NIFTY PROJECT WITH ONLY ONE STRING ATTACHED **SCRAPWOOD YO-YO**

Dollar for dollar, it's hard to beat the enjoyment kids—or adults—get from playing with yo-yos. You'll have fun making this terrific stocking stuffer, too.

FIRST, CONSTRUCT THE JIG

- 1 Mark a 3"-diameter circle and a 1½"-diameter circle on a piece of ¾"-thick scrap stock. Band-saw the discs to shape.
- 2 Glue and clamp the smaller disc to the center of the larger disc (locating it exactly on center isn't critical).
- 3 Fasten the 3" disc to a 3" faceplate and thread onto the headstock spindle. Slide the tailstock against the smaller disc to make a slight indentation at the disc's center. Back the tailstock away, and drill a ⅜" hole ¼" deep at the center point.
- 4 Glue a ⅜" dowel ⅝" long into the hole you just drilled.

gouge). Check the radius with a ⅜" round-over bit as shown in the photo below. Sand a slight round-over on the inside edge. Finish-sand the yo-yo half. Using a 1" chisel and a mallet, gently tap between the yo-yo half and 1½"-diameter disc to separate the two parts. Pry at several different spots for an easy release.



Check the turned radius with a ⅜" round-over bit.


NOW, TURN THE YO-YO PARTS

- 1 Mark a pair of 2½"-diameter circles on a piece of highly figured scrap stock. Band-saw the discs to shape.
- 2 Drill a ⅜" hole ¼" deep at the center point of each disc.
- 3 Using hot-melt adhesive, glue one of the yo-yo halves flat against the 1½"-diameter jig disc.
- 4 Turn the yo-yo half to a 2½" diameter, and then turn the piece to ½" thick. Next, turn a ⅜" radius on the outside corners (we used a small
- 5 Scrape the hot-melt adhesive off the jig, and sand the inside face of the yo-yo half. Repeat the procedure to turn the other half. Hold the two halves together and check the shapes. You want the two halves identical in profile and size for a true-spinning yo-yo. Remount and turn one half if necessary.
- 6 Cut a piece of ⅜" dowel to ⅝" long, and glue the two halves together. Apply the finish.
- 7 Order the yo-yo strings and trick book from the source listed in the Buying Guide.

THE FRAME COMES FIRST



- 1 Cut a piece of $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick stock to $1\frac{1}{2}$ " wide by 38" long. (See the Buying Guide for our source of wenge, or use walnut.)
- 2 Rout a $\frac{1}{4}$ " round-over along one edge of the long strip.
- 3 Cut or rout a $\frac{3}{8}$ " rabbet $\frac{7}{8}$ " deep in the strip where shown in the Section View Detail. Sand the long frame strip.
- 4 Miter-cut the four frame pieces (A) to $8\frac{1}{2}$ " long each. Glue and band-clamp the frame pieces together, checking for square.
- 5 Apply masking tape on the frame front where

shown in photo A. The tape is easy to mark on and minimizes chip-out when cutting the kerfs. Mark the $\frac{1}{8}$ "-wide kerf locations, and cut $\frac{1}{8}$ " kerfs $\frac{1}{8}$ " deep between the kerf lines. (We used a radial arm saw, but you could place the frame facedown and cut the kerfs on a table saw.)

6 Rip a $\frac{1}{8}$ "-thick strip of maple from the edge of a $\frac{1}{2}$ "- or $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick board. With a handsaw or scroll saw, cut a strip $\frac{3}{16}$ " wide from the strip for the timing marks. (We'll narrow the $\frac{3}{16}$ " width to $\frac{1}{8}$ " when we sand them flush with the frame.) Cut the hour marks to $1\frac{3}{16}$ " long, glue them in the kerfs, and sand them flush after the glue dries.

VENEER THE FACE

- 1 Cut a piece of hardboard (B) to fit the rabbeted opening in the frame (we cut ours $\frac{1}{16}$ " undersize to allow for movement of the frame).
- 2 Place the hardboard on the section of the veneer with the nicest figure (see the Buying Guide for our source of veneer). Use a utility knife to cut the veneer (see photo B). Peel off the backing sheet, and stick the veneer to the hardboard, with the edges flush.
- 3 Locate and drill a $\frac{3}{8}$ " hole in the center of the veneer face. (If you use a clock other than the one listed in the Buying Guide, measure the shaft diameter before drilling the hole.)



Mark the hour mark locations and cut the kerfs.

Position the hardboard and cut the veneer face with a knife.

Epoxy the metal disk to the back of the minute hand.

FORM THE HANDS

1 Rip a $\frac{1}{8}$ "-thick piece of wenge 12" long from the edge of a $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick board. Using carbon paper, transfer the hand patterns and hole center points onto the thin strip.

2 Using a band saw or scroll saw, cut the hands to shape. Drill a $\frac{3}{16}$ " hole

in the hour hand and a $\frac{5}{32}$ " hole in the minute hand. Sand the hands to $\frac{1}{16}$ " thick.

3 With scissors or tin snips, cut the shaft end off the minute hand supplied with the clock (all you need is the end with the hole). As shown in photo C, epoxy the

disk, centered over the $\frac{5}{32}$ " hole, to the back face of the minute hand.

THE END IS NEAR

1 Apply the finish to the clock frame, hands, and veneered face. Later, use silicone sealant to hold the face in the frame (see the Section View Detail).

2 Fasten the clock movement to the veneered face, and slip the clock hands onto the movement's shaft. Add a battery, hang, and be ready to cheerfully give anyone the time of day.

DUNE JUMPIN' BAJA BUGGY

Youngsters will feel the wind through their hair and the summer sun upon their faces when driving this beach buggy over the dunes of make-believe. This fat-tired toy requires just a few feet of 2×4 stock and about $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours to build. Can you think of an easier child pleaser?

SHAPE THE BODY AND FENDERS

1 Plane or resaw two 12"-long pieces of pine or fir 2×4 stock to $1\frac{1}{16}$ " thick. You also could use five-quarter ($5/4$) stock and eliminate the planing. Glue and clamp the pieces together face to face for the car body (A).

2 Transfer the full-sized car outline and axle-hole locations to a piece of paper. (We photocopied the pattern; you also could use carbon paper.) Cut the pattern outline to shape. Apply spray-on adhesive to the back side of the paper pattern, and stick the pattern to the pine block.

3 Drill a pair of $\frac{7}{16}$ " axle holes through the body where marked.

4 With a $\frac{1}{8}$ " blade on your band saw, cut the car body and window opening to shape.

5 Plane or resaw another 12"-long piece of 2×4 stock to $1\frac{1}{16}$ "


thick. Using the same transfer procedure described in step 2, lay out and cut the two fenders (B) to shape.

6 Sand a radius on the front and rear outside corners of the fenders as shown in the Fender Detail. (We marked the radii with a quarter, and shaped the radii with a belt sander.)

7 Remove the paper pattern, and hand-sand the car body and fenders.

8 Drill a pair of $\frac{7}{16}$ " holes $\frac{1}{4}$ " deep in the front of the car body to form the headlights. (We held the car body upright in a handscrew clamp, and drilled the holes on the drill press.)

9 Glue and clamp the fenders to the car body where located on the Full-Sized Pattern. The bottom middle section of the fenders should be flush with the bottom of the car body. Wipe off the excess glue with a damp cloth.



LET'S ADD THE WHEELS

1 Plane two 12" lengths of 2×4 stock to 1½". Laminate the two pieces together face to face. Allow the glue to dry.

2 Using a compass, mark four 2½"-diameter (1½" radius) circles on the top face of the laminated stock for the wheels (C).

3 Chuck a 1" Forstner or paddle bit into your drill press. Drill a 1½"-deep hole at the center of each marked wheel. Switch to a brad-point bit, and drill a ¾" hole through the center of each wheel.

4 Using a band saw, cut the four wheels to shape, cutting just outside the marked outline.

5 Fasten a wheel to a 5"-long piece of ¾"-threaded rod where shown on the drawing at right. Chuck the assembly into your drill press. With 80-grit sandpaper, sand the wheels smooth (we used a sanding block). Sand a ¾" round-over along the


outside edges. With the drill press stopped, check the sanded round-overs for uniformity with a ¾" round-over bit as shown at right. Finish-sand with finer grits of paper.

Repeat the process for the remaining wheels.



6 From ¾" dowel stock, cut two axles 4¾" long each. Glue one axle, flush with inside edge of the 1" hole, to each wheel. (See the Exploded-View Drawing for reference.) Insert the axles through the car body, and glue on the other two wheels so the wheel-axle assemblies rotate easily.

APPLY THE FINISH AND HEAD FOR THE DUNES

1 Apply two coats of clear finish. (We found that an oil finish tends to pick up too much dirt over time, but, paint, lacquer, or polyurethane work well.) Now, watch a deserving youngster's imagination run wild.



When sanding the band-sawed wheels to shape on the drill press, check round-overs with a ¾" round-over bit for uniformity.

START WITH THE NOTE PAD BOX

Note: You'll need thin stock for this project. You can either resaw or plane thicker stock to $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick.



1 To form the box top and bottom (A), cut a piece of $\frac{1}{4}$ " oak to $4\frac{7}{8}$ " wide by 14" long. (We planed down a $\frac{1}{2}$ "-thick oak board.) Draw a perpendicular line across the board $6\frac{1}{2}$ " from one end; then mark the center of the line. Bore a 1" hole at the centerpoint.

2 Cut the $\frac{1}{4}$ " board in two as shown in the photo far right. (We set a stop $6\frac{1}{2}$ " from the inside edge of the saw blade when cutting the top to length.) Save the $6\frac{1}{2}$ "-long oak piece for the box top. From

the remaining piece, crosscut the $\frac{1}{4}$ "-thick oak box bottom to a $6\frac{1}{2}$ " finished length.

3 Locate and drill the $\frac{1}{8}$ " hole for the pen funnel in the $\frac{1}{4}$ "-thick oak box top. **4** Cut a $\frac{1}{4}$ "-wide by 18"-long strip from the edge of a $\frac{1}{2}$ "-thick oak board. Now, cut the box sides (B) and end (C) to length from the 18" strip.

5 With the outside edges flush, glue and clamp the sides and end to the bottom piece. Later, glue and clamp the box top to the bottom assembly.

6 Sand the box smooth. Now, with a table-mounted router and fence, rout $\frac{1}{4}$ " roundovers on the top and bottom edges except at the finger notch. Finish-sand the routed box.

FORMING THE WHALE

1 From $\frac{1}{4}$ "-thick walnut, oak, and cherry, cut three pieces $4 \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ " long.

2 Cover one face of the oak and one face of the walnut with double-faced tape. Now, stack the three pieces together as shown on the drawing *below*. Using carbon paper, transfer the full-sized whale pattern to a $4 \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ " piece of paper. Adhere the pattern to the oak with spray adhesive.

3 With a scroll saw or a band saw fitted with a $\frac{1}{8}$ " blade, cut the whale pieces to shape. Separate the pieces, and remove the tape.

4 Epoxy together all the parts for one whale, except for the pectoral and tail fins. Sand round-

overs on the whale body where shown on the Full-Sized Pattern.

5 Tape waxed paper to a piece of plywood, and hold the whale body to the plywood with a few small nails. Then, sand a round-over on the front edge of the pectoral fin, and epoxy it to the whale body where shown in the photo *below*. Now, sand the tail fins to shape and epoxy them to the whale body. Later, finish-sand the fins to shape. (We drum-sanded the bottom side of the tail so it wouldn't lie flat on the box.) Locate and drill a $\frac{1}{8}$ " hole for the eye.

FINAL ASSEMBLY

1 Thread the mounting screw into the bottom of the pen funnel. Using a


hack saw, cut the screw so only $\frac{1}{4}$ " of thread protrudes from the bottom of the funnel.

2 Epoxy the funnel with the exposed screw thread into the hole in the box top. Now, epoxy the whale to the top of the oak box. Immediately wipe off any excess epoxy around the whale.

3 Mask off the funnel, and apply a clear finish to the oak box and whale. (We used an aerosol finish.)

Collector's Edition

DEPTH GAUGE



You're not likely to misplace this shop heirloom. In fact, you may want to build several of these simple, yet elegant depth gauges; they make excellent gifts. Used for measuring dadoes, mortises, and other recesses where an exact reading is critical, this is one high-quality measuring tool.



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Hold the cap in a small handscrew clamp, and file ► the nipple threads for easy insertion into the walnut body.

FORM THE WALNUT BODY

1 Cut a piece of $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick walnut stock to $1\frac{3}{4} \times 6"$ for the body.

2 Make a photocopy of the full-sized pattern. Using spray adhesive, adhere the paper pattern to the walnut. (You could transfer the pattern directly to the walnut with carbon paper.)

3 Mark a center point on the top edge of the walnut directly above and aligned with the $\frac{3}{8}$ " hole center point. (See the photo at right for reference.)

4 Drill a $\frac{3}{8}$ " hole $\frac{5}{8}$ " deep into the face of the walnut at the marked center point.

5 Thread the $\frac{3}{8}$ " cap onto the $\frac{3}{8}$ " nipple *as far as it will thread*. (See the Buying Guide for our hardware source.) As shown in the photo below, clamp the cap into a handscrew clamp, and file the exposed nipple

threads. (We used a dowel to hold the nipple stationary when filing.) File the threads until the nipple slides easily into the hole in the walnut.

6 Hold the nipple (cap still threaded on) with a pair of pliers, and *rotate the cap 2 turns counterclockwise*. Push the nipple and cap into the $\frac{3}{8}$ " hole in the walnut. Drill a $\frac{5}{32}$ " hole through the assembly as shown in the photo below.



▲ Center a $\frac{5}{32}$ " bit over the walnut, and drill through the walnut and brass nipple.

- 7 Remove the nipple and cap from the walnut body. Do not remove the paper pattern.


ADD THE BRASS BASE

- 1 Crosscut a piece of $\frac{1}{16} \times \frac{3}{4}$ " brass to 6" long.
2 Use double-faced tape to adhere brass to the bottom of the body. Using the screw-hole location lines on the pattern, drill and countersink $\frac{7}{64}$ " holes through the brass. Switch bits and drill $\frac{5}{32}$ " pilot holes $\frac{5}{16}$ " deep into the walnut. (We held the walnut firmly in a handscrew clamp when drilling the holes.)

FINAL ASSEMBLY

- 1 Remove the brass strip and nipple assembly from the walnut. Band-saw the walnut body to shape, and sand the cut edges smooth. Rout a $\frac{1}{4}$ " round-over along the top edges. To keep your fingers safely away from the router bit, hold the walnut body firmly in a handscrew clamp. You'll have to stop, reposition the clamp, and continue routing. Remove the remaining paper pattern.
2 Screw the brass strip to the bottom of the walnut. File and sand the edges of the brass strip even with the rounded-over edges of the walnut.

PUT THE DEPTH GAUGE TO WORK



Note: #4 screw requires a $\frac{5}{64}$ " pilot hole $\frac{5}{16}$ " deep in walnut.

Using the previously drilled $\frac{5}{32}$ " hole in the walnut body as a guide, drill a $\frac{5}{32}$ " hole through the brass for the rod.
3 Sand the depth gauge smooth. Mask the brass and apply the finish to the walnut. Cut a piece of $\frac{1}{8}$ " brass rod to 6" long.

BUYING GUIDE

Thread the cap onto the nipple, and insert the nipple into the walnut. Align the $\frac{5}{32}$ " hole in the nipple with the hole in the walnut. Insert the $\frac{1}{8}$ " brass rod.

Position the depth gauge over the depression you wish to measure.

Push the brass rod to the bottom of the depression. Tighten the cap on the nipple. The cap will pull the nipple forward and lock the brass rod in place. Finally, measure the length of brass rod protruding from the bottom of the gauge to determine the depth.

Note: If you do a lot of turning, you may want to make a larger version for checking the depth of bowls. To do so, increase the length of the walnut body, brass strip, and brass rod.

THE CONNOISEUR'S CRIBBAGE



Even a busy guy like Santa can't resist playing cribbage on this laminated game board. After you've played the last hand, you can open the sliding door—hidden on the board's bottom side—to conveniently store a deck of cards and the pegs.

CUT THE BOARD PIECES TO SIZE

1 Cut one piece of $1\frac{1}{16}$ "-thick maple ($\frac{3}{4}$ stock) to $1\frac{1}{4}$ " wide by 22" long. Later, you'll cut the maple in half to form the two streets (A).

2 Cut a piece of $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick walnut to $2\frac{5}{8} \times 10$ " long for the center strip (B). (We used a piece of highly figured walnut.)

3 From $\frac{1}{2}$ " or $\frac{3}{4}$ " walnut stock, cut a piece to $2\frac{13}{16} \times 12$ " for the sliding door (C) and the doorstop (D). Plane or resaw the piece to $\frac{5}{16}$ " thick for parts C and D.


MACHINE THE MAPLE STREETS

1 Chuck a $\frac{1}{2}$ " dovetail bit into your table-mounted router. Position the bit and router table fence where shown on the drawing at left. Start the router, and rout along one edge of the 22"-long maple strip.

2 Crosscut two 10" maple streets from the 22"-long strip. With double-faced tape, tape the two 10" strips together side by side with the routed areas facing each other. Now, cut out or make a photocopy of the full-sized Hole Pattern on the opposite page. Apply spray adhesive to the back side of the pattern, and stick it to one of the maple streets.




3 Use a try square to mark lines through the hole center points and across the other maple street where shown on the photo at right.

Mark a line on the fence directly behind the bit where shown in the photo.


5 Drill $\frac{1}{8}$ " holes $\frac{1}{4}$ " deep to complete the outer



row. (We used the depth stop on our drill press to ensure consistent hole depths.) Without moving the fence, turn the maple lamination end for end and drill the other outer row of holes.

6 Realign the bit with a center point in the inner row, and position the fence. Next, drill the holes for the two inner rows. Separate the streets and remove the tape.

NOW, HOLLOW OUT THE CENTER STRIP CAVITIES

1 Using the dimensions on the Exploded-View Drawing on the previous page, mark the locations, and cut the dadoes for the playing-card and player cavities. Sand the bottoms of the dadoes.

2 Mark the center point, and drill the holes for the bullet catch. (See the hole sizes on the Exploded-View Drawing and accompanying Bullet Catch Detail.)

3 With the bottom surfaces and ends flush, glue and clamp the center strip between the

maple streets. Wipe off the glue squeeze-out immediately with a damp rag. Let the glue dry and then remove the clamps.

4 Mark the location, and drill the eight holes for the game score tracks where shown on the drawing *above*.

MAKE THE DOOR AND DOOR STOP

1 Reposition the dovetail bit and router table fence where shown on the drawing *above right*. Rout along both edges of one of the $\frac{5}{16}$ " walnut strips where shown on the drawing. Check the fit of the test strip between the dovetail grooves in the laminated board. If the thin strip is too wide, sand or plane one edge slightly, and rerout the edge until the piece slides easily.

2 Cut the door (C) and door stop (D) to length from the 12"-long piece.

3 With the ends flush, glue the doorstop to the center strip.

4 Backing the stock with scrap to prevent chip-out, drill a $\frac{3}{4}$ " finger hole

through the door where dimensioned on the Exploded-View Drawing.

INSTALL THE BULLET CATCH

1 Press the bullet catch into the hole in the center walnut strip.


2 To locate the bullet catch recess in the door, slide the door open and shut several times. Remove the door, and drill a $\frac{3}{16}$ " hole $\frac{1}{8}$ " deep at the end of the indented line scribed by the bullet catch. See the Bullet Catch Detail.

FINISHING UP


1 Slide the door in place, and sand the cribbage board smooth. Now, rout a $\frac{1}{4}$ " round-over along all edges and corners. With the door in place, sand cribbage board smooth.

2 Apply the finish. (For an even finish, we pounded nails through a scrap of wood where shown in the drawing *above right*. Then, we positioned the cribbage board upside down on the nails and sprayed on the finish. After the finish

dried, we turned the board over, and sprayed the top of the board. To prevent the playing holes from clogging, we used an aerosol finish.) Apply paraffin to the edges of the dovetailed lid for a smooth slide. Finally, read 'em and weep.



FULL-SIZED HALF PATTERNS



Michael Mode's wife, Kathryn, had a simple request just before Christmas, 1983, "Why not turn a few ornaments to decorate the tree?" Being a dutiful husband, this creative Zionsville, Pennsylvania, turner went to the shop and emerged a few hours later bearing gifts like the ones shown here. Since then, Mike has turned at least 8,000 ornaments to add to his crafts-fair inventory. Here's how he turns and paints these lovely tree trimmers.

TOOLS OF THE TRADE

Mike employs four turning tools to make the ornaments: a 1" gouge to turn the blank round; a $\frac{1}{2}$ " gouge to refine the shape; a $\frac{3}{8}$ " fingernail gouge for the beads, coves, and hollows; and a $\frac{1}{2}$ " skew, for the tapers, broad convex shapes, and deep valleys.



TURNING THE STOCK TO SHAPE

Begin with a piece of yellow poplar $1\frac{3}{4}$ " square by 6" long. Find center on one end, drill a pilot hole there, and mount the stock to a screw center. To avoid hitting the center when turning, leave a small waste block next to the faceplate.

After making numerous ornaments, Mike has several tips. "First, partially turn the bottom—the portion farthest from the headstock," instructs Mike. "Then, work on the middle and the top. Finally, repeat the process starting at the bottom again. If you turn one area completely, the ornament may get too thin and snap. If you don't have a screw center, turn the ornament between centers with the top (screw-eye end) against the tailstock. The



tailstock center mark will eventually become the point of insertion for the screw eye." Use the full-sized patterns to turn your own ornaments.

SAND AND PAINT

Sand the piece with 220-grit paper, and paint the ornament on the lathe, with the lathe running at around 600 rpm. Mike has had the best luck with stiff-bristle brushes, about $\frac{1}{4}$ " long by $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide. "I use water-based acrylic paints of thick consistency, about like cream. Apply the paint heavily, just short of the coloring flying off."

After the paint dries, remove the ornament from the lathe, and cut off the scrap end. Sand and paint the ends. Finally, insert a small screw eye and hang.

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

Harley Refsal

Carver Harley Refsal makes his home in Decorah, Iowa, historic gateway for Scandinavian immigrant pioneers of the upper Midwest. Born in Minnesota of a Norwegian farm family, Harley knows firsthand the rural folk he likes to carve in caricature.

His rough-surfaced carving style lends itself well to the rough-hewn individuals who broke prairie ground. Harley calls the style "flat-plane" carving because it leaves

the flat plane of each cut on the wood. "With this style," Harley explains, "a few lines and cuts can say a great deal."

At Christmas, Harley delves into his Scandinavian heritage to carve seasonal symbols. His favorite yuletide carving is Father Christmas. "Historically, the figure belongs to many Old World countries," he notes. "Father Christmas is not Santa Claus bearing gifts, but a spirit of love, goodwill, and caring."

The WOOD® staff whittled Father Christmas at a workshop taught by Harley. The results were so pleasing we thought we'd share the pattern.

CARVING AND FINISHING FATHER CHRISTMAS


Harley carves air-dried northern basswood that he often harvests himself

from the nearby wooded hills and valleys. This figure requires a 3x3x7" block of basswood or other paintable wood.

"The object is to carve the square block into a cylindrical shape," Harley says. "Pencil in a circular guideline on the base to follow. When you get to the arms, forget about roundness! The line from elbow to coat cuff on each must be straight."

Texture the figure's beard and mustache with a narrow-angled V-tool. To give the fur trim a different look, switch to a small gouge.

Norma, Harley's wife, finishes his carvings. She thins acrylics to a wash consistency and brushes them on. "This method lets the wood-grain show through," explains Harley. "For a shadow effect, dip the colored figure in a mixture of boiled linseed oil and umber artist's oil color — about one teaspoon color to a quart of linseed oil. When it's dry, buff the carving with a wool sock for an old, well-handled look." ♣

A FIT BIT FOR STILE-AND-RAIL CONSTRUCTION

Amana's reversible stile-and-rail set performs well with or without a router table, although it took a little trial-and-error adjustment to get my opposing cuts to line up. But with just a little practice, it's easy to turn out classy frames or molding cuts. The carbide-tipped bit also cut a nice slot for splines and does accurate tongue-and-groove work. The

set includes three styles of blades: Roman ogee, classical, and standard, in addition to the tongue-and-groove blade.

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
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Simple ideas can lead to spectacular solutions, and this idea seems so obvious that many woodturners will wonder why they didn't think of it. Undoubtedly, some shop tinkerers have invented their own versions of this combination measuring and cutting tool. However, we haven't seen a tool like this marketed before.

The problem: How to consistently turn tenons that fit a mating hole. Removing the part from the lathe to check the tenon's fit or continually measuring tenons with a caliper is time-consuming, so Iowa woodworker Rick Reeves came up with a solution: Attach an extendable cutting edge and angle iron to match the hole size.

The hefty tool performed well in our test, cutting accurate tenons with good balance. Reeves' turning tool comes in two sizes. The smallest cuts $\frac{3}{8}$ "-long tenons, from $\frac{1}{4}$ " to $\frac{3}{4}$ " in diameter. The largest cuts a $\frac{5}{8}$ "-long tenon, $\frac{1}{2}$ " to $1\frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter. Reeves makes the handles from cherry, maple, or walnut, depending on the hardwood being used in his shop at the time.

Reeves' Woodturning Sizing Tool;
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The high rpm of a Dremel motor tool make it ideal for a number of carving, polishing, sanding, and drilling jobs. The cordless feature of Dremel's new Freewheeler model magnifies this versatility.

I gave the two-speed Freewheeler a full charge and got more than 30 minutes use out of it, using it first to help shape a set of cabriole legs. Before the Dremel tool, I was using a sanding sleeve chucked in a hand drill to do the job, and was amazed at how much quicker the Freewheeler did the work.

On the same charge, I polished some turning tools, and sharpened a cannelated gouge. A half hour of running time per charge appears to be about average for most uses, according to the owner's manual.

But for some heavy-duty uses, such as cutting or grinding metal, Dremel says a full charge may last only 10 minutes. Once the tool has run down, it takes three hours to fully recharge.

Accessories include cutters (high-speed, engraving and tungsten carbide), polishing points, router bits, mandrels, wire brushes, and grinding stones. A speed-setting chart in the owner's manual serves as a handy reference guide.

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

FOOT POWER



A foot switch can be a big boost to skill levels when precision work demands the use of both hands, and this switch works well. Recommended use: 120-volt motors of up

to $\frac{1}{2}$ hp. Good candidates include scroll saws, drill presses, lathes, grinders, and other power tools that aren't likely to cause serious injury if you accidentally step on the switch. Table saws, radial-arm saws, surface planers, jointers, and other more powerful tools fall into the not-recommended group here. Another safety note: Always turn your equipment off at the regular switch when changing blades, bits, etc., or after finishing a task.

IS TREATED LUMBER SAFE?

Q. Is Wolmanized lumber safe to use in garden and yard applications? I've heard that lumber treated with chromated copper arsenic (CCA) does not leach out. Recently, I read where it is not safe to use CCA-treated wood for cold frames or as sandbox material where children would be exposed to the wood.


A. We called Dallas and talked to Dennis Macel, a regional sales manager for the Koppers Co. Inc., the firm that holds patent rights to Wolmanized wood. He assures us that picnic tables, sandboxes, fences, and garden frames are some of the best uses of rot-resistant CCA-treated wood. The CCA material, according to Macel, will not leach from the wood.

YOU'LL KNOW A BLADE IS DULL WHEN...

Q. How do you determine when a table saw blade is dull? When is it practical and economical to have a dull blade resharpened?

—Austin T. Moser, Frederick, Md.

A. Jim Boelling, our Project Builder, suggested seven ways to know if a saw blade needs resharpening: if you feel extra vibration, if the wood smokes and burns, if you can hear extra laboring sounds from the motor, if you notice increasing resistance while feeding the stock, if the stock pulls away from the fence, if the teeth show a shiny spot where there once was a point, or if the cut wood pinches the saw blade.



If any of these points occur and if you can't remember when the blade was last resharpened, it's time to visit the sharpening shop!

DIPPING TOY PARTS

Q. I am making small children's toys from knotty pine ripped and crosscut to 1/4x1/4x5". I have hundreds of pieces I would like to dip in stain the color of medium-strength tea and then finish with a non-toxic finish.

I have tried vegetable oil, but since I can't wipe off the excess oil from each piece, there is always an oily feeling to the strips.

A quick-penetrating water solution would be best, I believe, as I can heat-dry them with a hair dryer.

A. We gave John Moser of Wood Finishing Supply in Macedon, N.Y., a call about this one. John suggests you dip the pieces in an alcohol-soluble aniline dye. Adjust the intensity of the stain with alcohol. After the wood dries, dip the pine strips in a lacquer thinned to dipping consistency. "Dipping consistency is tough to determine," John cautions. "If it's too thick, the lacquer dries in strings. You want lacquer to drip off so that the drops separate and don't leave a deposit at the corner. The lacquer dries quickly and toxic-free. You won't need to use heat. In fact, the heat could draw knot resin through the finish."

NEVER JOIN BEFORE ITS TIME

Q. Some time back, I turned some walnut trinket boxes, laminating strips of 1/4"-thick stock built up to 3". I used Franklin Hide Glue. Although not visibly noticeable, several months later I noticed that I could "feel" the glue at each joint. My question is: Should I have used epoxy glue? I've never had this problem before. I would have expected this problem with aliphatic resin glue, but not with hide glue. The wood was seasoned about a year before I glued it up.

A. The glue is not the problem, Howard. It's too late to put a moisture meter to the wood, but Jim Boelling, our WOOD magazine project builder, suspects that from what you've told us, the wood was too wet when you built the boxes. The rule of thumb for air drying is two years for the first inch in thickness and one year for each additional inch. It's a good bet the wood was still shrinking away from the joint when you turned the boxes. Sometimes dressing down thicker stock also will destabilize the stock at the time of gluing. If you can safely remount the boxes on the lathe, they can be turned and finished after the wood has stabilized.

And speaking of gluing, hide glue sets best above 70° F. If the room temperature dips below 70° F—as it must on occasion in Montana—you should warm hide glue in water. ♣

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THE STORY OF THE FIDDLE AND THE VIOLIN, A FRONTIER MISHAP

Fort Smyrna
Ohio Territory
June 11, 1802*

Dear Uncle Zolly,

What a burden has fallen upon my shoulders! Bill Jarvis' mule sat down on the only decent fiddle this side of the Shenandoah. The harvest dance is but three days hence, the young people are sorely vexed, and the job of mending it has fallen to me! I am a good woodworker, but I am no luthier (as these instrument-makers are called). This will surely test my skills. I will continue this letter after the dance, for they are counting on me.

With steam from the kettle, Chaney loosened the remaining glue joints to see what could be saved. The maple neck with its fancy carved scroll and tuning pegs seemed to be alright, as did the ebony fingerboard. The soundbox, however, was smashed. The only other salvageable part was a curious label glued on the inside of the back. Chaney could make no sense of it. It read: "Antonius Stradivarius Cremonensis faciebat Anno 1721."


The fiddle's resurrection begins

Chaney did recognize the wood of the back and sides of the fiddle as curly maple. He was able to saw them out from a gunstock blank that he had set aside to season many years before. Lacking the tiny convex-bottomed luthier's planes, he duplicated the broken back just as he would make a wooden platter, shaping its outline and then gouging and smoothing the hollows with a scraper made from an old saw blade.

The sides of the fiddle, no thicker than a piece of cardboard, were made from six arching pieces. It was no easy job for him to saw these thin strips from the

hard maple. Chaney figured that he would have to dry-bend the wood (steam-bending would make the wood swell up too much), so after heating a musket barrel in the fire, he used it as a hot fulcrum to bend the pieces around. The wood held its shape, but it took him no end of trouble to assemble the six curving pieces with glue blocks at their intersections and then glue them to the back. It is a wonder that he succeeded at all without the aid of a mold, the temporary wooden base used by luthiers.

By now, Chaney reckoned this might not be too hard a job. After all, it was just a glued-up box of spruce and maple. Just a 14"-long box made of 70 (even before a mule sits on it) pieces of wood. It was only a 28-oz. box able to hold the 68 lb. pull of the tuned-up strings on one side. Just a little box that can make a thousand people cry or dance with joy, and Chaney had made boxes before.

Wood with music in it

The top side with the two f-shaped holes in it (he reasoned that they were to let the sound come out) was some kind of quarter-cut spruce. The neighboring cooper had some dry stock set aside for bucket staves, but Chaney must have gone through about a hundred of them before hitting on one that sounded like it had music in it. The original top was made of two pieces glued together down the middle, so Chaney split the stave lengthwise, opened the two pieces out like a book and glued their edges together. He had little time to match the varying thicknesses of the original top, for time was growing short before the dance, and the fiddle must be mended with due haste.

A neatly cut dovetail joined the base of the neck to the topmost glue block in the soundbox. Once he had it set into place, Chaney

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

knew he had the job licked. In his excitement, he almost forgot to replace that curious label so that it could again be seen through the f-holes that he had whittled through the top before he glued it down.

The two different woods posed a problem when it came to the finishing. Chaney knew that the spruce would take up any stain much faster than the maple and turn much darker. To make an even job of it, he prepared a varnish of rosin, turpentine, and linseed oil. He cooked it in an old iron pot, which made the color deeper the longer it boiled. The third coat was barely dry when he reattached the catgut strings. Drawing the horsehair bow across the strings, Chaney brought forth a sound from the resurrected fiddle — something like the screech of a horse stepping on a cat. But, Chaney had never pretended to be a musician as well as a woodworker.

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

pounds). Chisels, for example, generally have a hardness rating from 58 to the mid-60s.

Teeth on many circular saw blades have to be bent to the side, or “set,” so, compared to chisels, they must be of a relatively softer-tempered steel. A saw blade with the teeth area tempered to the rating of a chisel would be too brittle to set. Instead, they fall in the Rc 40-45 range, which probably won’t be advertised as more than “body of hardened steel.”

Manufacturers rate carbide on the *Rockwell A* (expressed as *Ra*) scale tested against a 60-kilogram weight. The ratings read C-1 through C-4—the higher the number, the harder and more brittle the substance.

FINDING QUALITY IN THE NUMBERS

Manufacturers selling high-quality carbide-tipped saw blades and router bits traditionally pick the correct hardness grade for the job. Barry Dunsmore, assistant vice president of Freud, Inc., notes that the grade of carbide used on tools depends on their application and the amount of abuse or shock they will receive.

Shaper and router cutters, with only two to three wings, contact wood intermittently, and receive intense pounding. Only a softer, C-2 grade carbide can withstand the beating.

Circular saw blades, on the other hand, have enough teeth to receive a more even and constant pressure with less shock. Therefore, teeth can tolerate more brittle grades—up to C-4.

High Rockwell C ratings result in expensive tools. Harder steel holds an edge longer than softer steel. However, the harder the steel, the more brittle it becomes. Softer steel, while it dulls faster, resharpening more quickly. So, perhaps you don’t need top-dollar, Rc 65-rated steel. Tools rated as low as Rc 58 will still be an excellent and affordable value. ♣

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
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YESTERDAY'S TOOLS

FOLDING RULES RULED OUT BY PROGRESS



Top to bottom: A 2' four-fold Stanley No. 87 ivory rule with German silver, valued at about \$150; an H. Chapin 1' four-fold, boxwood rule, valued at about \$35; and a 3' four-fold Lufkin no. 3881 rule, about \$30. The arched-top hinge shown on these rules was the most popular type.

Prior to the establishment of linear standards in Europe and America in the early 19th century, measuring was a highly individual endeavor. In the days when the English inch equaled three round, dry barley grains placed end to end, homemade rules prevailed. Craftsmen cut these handcrafted tools from wood in 2-3' lengths. Brass nails or saw kerfs marked the increments down to $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

Standards of measurement enabled the mass production of rules. But, until the advent of precise equipment to machine the wood, stamp out and install the hinges, and apply the scale graduations in the mid-1800s, manufacturing rules was a labor-intensive task. With machines, the folding-rule industry boomed in the United States. By the early 1870s, New England manufacturers alone produced more than 50 styles.

EYE-PLEASING RULES WITH TRIM OF GERMAN SILVER
Offered in two-fold and four-fold models and 1', 2', 3', and 4' lengths, the machine-made folding rules became standard tools. The arched-top hinge shown above became the leading configuration.

For rule bodies, most companies favored boxwood, a dense, stable wood first imported from Turkey and Russia, and later Venezuela. Hickory, mahogany, maple, and rosewood also appeared as rules. However, the most expensive rules were made from elephant ivory.

Corrosion-resistant brass, because it machined easily, became hinges and binding for most rules. For ivory rules, metal mate was German silver (a copper alloy).

MEASURING ELEGANCE BOWS TO CONVENIENCE

Following the development of the more-easily extended zigzag rule and the compact, coiled-spring tape measure in the early 1900s, the folding rule lost its appeal. The Stanley Rule and Level Company—one of the world's foremost manufacturers of folding rules—discontinued making ivory rules by 1920. By 1945, Stanley sold only a handful of boxwood rules.

Boxwood folding rules sell in the \$10 to \$20 price range. Unusual examples, such as rules with rare markings, sell for \$100 and up. Ivory rules start at \$100 in less-than-fine condition, and have been sold for more than \$1,000 in prime condition.
