### Use one fastener to lock another in place

A lockwasher keeps a roundhead screw from working loose. But, what can you do to keep a flathead screw tight in a countersunk hole, as on a hinge?



TIP: After you've tightened the screw, drill a small hole through one end of the slot in the screw head and on through the piece of hardware. Drive a wire brad or small nail into the hole. This keeps the screw from turning, so it can't work loose.

### Safety pin facilitates inside scrollsaw cuts

Scrollsaws that accept only pinend blades limit your ability to make inside cuts—sometimes the smallest hole that the blade will fit through is larger than the area you want to cut out.

TIP: Remove the pin from the top of the blade. Now, raid the sewing drawer to find a heavy safety pin that fits the hole snugly.



Snip the safety pin where shown. You now have a blade retaining pin with a loop handle, and a blade that fits through a much smaller start hole.


#### This stick-on center solves a sticky cutting problem

Cutting a circular piece with a trammel-mounted router or portable sabersaw leaves a hole right in the middle. What can you do to make a circle without a hole in the middle?

TIP: Make a no-hole centerpoint by modifying a self-adhesive plastic towel hook. (You can buy them in packages at hardware or variety stores.) Cut off the hook, and sand the front of the adhesive-backed base flat. At the center, drill a hole to fit a common nail. Push the nail through from the adhesive side, and cut it off so it protrudes about 1". Trim the adhesive backing around the nail-head and epoxy the nail into position, if necessary.

To use, mark the center of your cutting piece with a large X. Stick the centerpoint over the mark, and put the hole in the trammel arm over the nail. Afterwards,

peel the centerpoint off.

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

A starting block sets shelf standards straight

Stray the least bit off the mark when installing shelf standards, and your shelves rock maddeningly. How can you set them right?



TIP: Fit a spacer block between the cabinet bottom and a slot near the bottom of the shelf standard. Install a shelf clip upside down in the slot, and then rest it on top of the block to position the standard while you drive in the screws or nails. Repeat for the other standards for accurate placement.



#### Set paint on a paddle for a clean benchtop

Finish cans leave drips and rings that mar your benchtop. Even if you put down papers, some of the finish may soak through and make a mess, anyway.

TIP: Just cut a rectangular paddle similar to the one shown to fit the finish-can size you're using. Add three 34×34" strips, placing the two side ones on a slight angle to create a wedge-shaped opening to hold the can securely. Drill a hole in the handle so you can hang the paddle up between uses.





#### Pull the plug on tenoning troubles


You could turn a round tenon on square stock. But, what if you don't have a lathe?


TIP: Make those round tenons with a tablesaw, drill press, and plug cutter. After determining the tenon dimensions (for example, a 3/4"-diameter, 5/8"-long tenon on 11/2" square stock), subtract the diameter from the thickness of the stock. Set your tablesaw's cutting depth to *balf* that distance (that's 3/8" in our example).

Now, using your tablesaw miter gauge and a stopblock, cut a kerf 5%" (or your tenon length) from the end of the stock on each face. Be sure to measure from the end of the stock to the farthest side of the blade. (Step 1 below.)

Next, chuck a plug cutter the diameter of your tenon into your drill press. Then, holding the workpiece firmly with clamps, center the plug cutter on the end of the stock, start the drill press, and cut the tenon. (Step 2.)



Plastic light grid shines for screwdriver storage


Screwdrivers, awls, chisels, and the like sometimes seem to defy organization. Too often, they end up tossed in a drawer. That means rummaging through dozens of tools to find the one you need.

TIP: Organize lots of tools in a small area with this handy rack. Start with a plastic grid made to cover fluorescent lights in suspended ceilings (available in

2'×4' panels at most lumberyards and home centers). Cut two matching pieces of the grid to a convenient size.


Build the surround from 1×6 (nominal) stock. Cut 3/8"-deep grooves to hold the grids 3/4" from each edge on the inside face. Assemble the surround with screws, and hang the completed rack on your toolboard or shop wall.

#### Hook up a shop vacuum to collect some dust

You don't bave a built-in dust-collection system in your shop. Instead, you try to collect dust and chips with your shop vacuum when you're doing a lot of cutting, sanding, or routing. You position the bose alongside your work area, but it just won't stay put on its own.



TIP: An S-hook will hold the hose in position for you. Just drill a hole in the side of the hose (or the nozzle) about 1/2" from the open end. Insert an S-hook (available at hardware stores) in the hole. Then, hold the hose in position by inserting the other end of the hook into a hole drilled in your workbench or tool table.

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

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

#### O-ring ends "oh, darn!" when changing router bit

The edge-forming router bit you're chucking keeps sliding all the way down in the collet, but it needs to be higher. With both bands occupied with collet wrenches, you can't hold the bit in position.

TIP: Slide a rubber O-ring onto the router-bit shank before you insert it into the collet. (You'll find 1/4"- and 1/2"-inside diameter O-rings in the plumbing aisle of the hardware store.) Position the bit at the height you want, and slide the O-ring down to the collet face. Now, you can tighten the collet nut while the O-ring holds the bit for you.

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

#### Help save the butternut

As both a subscriber to WOOD magazine and a forest pathologist, I was disappointed that the profile on butternut (October 1992) did not mention Butternut Canker, a serious threat to the species. This disease has caused a serious decline of butternut over the last 25 years.

The U.S. Forest Service has an aggressive breeding program to

save the butternut, gathering material from apparently resistant trees for use in breeding resistant planting stock to help reestablish the species. The Forest Service allows heavily infected, unhealthy, and dead trees to be harvested, while evaluating the remainder for their resistance to the disease.

The majority of the butternut trees are on private land. Many land owners, fearing that their trees may become infected, schedule pre-emptive salvage cuts and may be destroying potentially resistant breeding stock.

The policy of the Forest Service will lead, in the short run, to a decreased supply of butternut, and an increased price. In the long run, the species may be brought back. It is not only the tropical hardwoods we must protect, the domestic resources also need our protection.

#### Two ways to hone, Mate

I read your "Products that Perform" column in the June 1993 issue reviewing the Hone-Mate. The article said to dip the Hone-Mate in oil, and then give the knives a few strokes. The instructions I received with my Hone-Mate say nothing about dipping it in oil. Which way is correct?

Both ways are correct, Herb. We contacted Woodworker's Supply, and we were told that the stone could be used either wet or dry, and that the use of a lightweight oil will help keep the Hone-Mate clean. Bob McFarlin, who tested the tool, suggested using no more than a drop or two of light oil on the knives to reduce the necessary clean-up. Wipe the oil off the stone when finished to prevent a buildup of small metal particles.

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

Tying up loose ends on dust-control grounding

After reading your recent articles on dust-collection systems, I still need some clarification. I'm not certain how and where to hook the starting and ending points of the ground wire that runs through the PVC pipes to reduce static. Should I hook one end to the dust collector and try to hook the other ends at each tool? Can I simply run the wire to the last joint in the pipe/hose system where it connects with the tool?

Good questions, Mark. First, you only need to ground the system in one place, such as to a stationary tool that is grounded itself, or to a cold water pipe. Then, extend the grounding wire-that can be any bare metal wire (braided wire is not necessary)—through the system's pipes. You don't have to extend through the entire length of the system, but the more area you cover, the less occurance of static buildup. Anchor the ends of the wires to the PVC pipe by drilling a small hole, running the wire through and tying it off. Fill the hole with silicone caulk.



Tissue box cover-up gets foam-rubber holders

I have a suggestion for the "Classy Tissue Box Cover-Up" in the September 1992 issue of WOOD. Instead of the two nails and rubber band to hold the tissue box inside, I used four 1x2"

piéces of 1/4" foam. I used a hotmelt-glue gun to stick one piece to each side. This makes it easier to get the tissue box in and out of the cover-up.

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
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


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

#### Watch that rotation!


In all of the woodworking magazines and woodworking shows I have seen, everyone using a radial-arm saw will pull the blade through the work, cutting with the rotation of the blade. For safety's sake, I would think the saw should be pushed through the work. As a machinist, I was taught to feed the work into the rotation of the blade. Could you explain the reason for the different procedure with the radial arm saw?

For an answer to your question Jim, we contacted Dave Hazelwood, a Sears/Craftsman power tool specialist. He said that when you crosscut with a radial-arm saw, you should pull the blade through the work to force the wood against the rear fence and down to the table. Starting the crosscut with the blade at the front of the table, and pushing through, could lift the front of the board and possibly throw the board back up and away from the table. This could damage both the wood and the radial-arm saw.

Straight-line ripping of wood with the radial-arm saw does require pushing the wood into the rotation of the saw blade. Feeding the wood in the direction of the saw blade's rotation while ripping could cause the blade to grab the wood and pull it quickly through the saw, often along with any hands or fingers holding the wood.

Sliding-miter saws do have instructions that say you should push the blade through the wood while crosscutting. Dave stated that the recommended procedure for using this tool is to pull the saw out to the front of the material to be cut, lower the blade, and start the cut into the wood at the same time. Then push the saw through the wood to finish the cut as shown below, left. Starting the crosscut with the sliding-miter saw in front of the wood with the blade already lowered has the same potential for grabbing and throwing the wood as does the radial-arm saw.



#### A guide for router fence improvements

I built the router fence system shown in the January 1993 issue of WOOD® Magazine, and I made a few improvements. First, I added a ¼ x ½ x 3" acrylic guide to the back of the bit guard. This piece, which fits into a corresponding groove in the router fence, makes the guard easier to adjust up and down, and it eliminates the rocking motion of this piece.

I also equipped the feather boards with similar wooden guides that fit into 45° slots in the fence. This allows finer adjustment of the feather board, and permits movement in one axis only.

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The strychnine tree (strychnos nux vomica), native to Southeast Asia and Australia, provides benefits other than varmint control. The peoples of Southeast Asia used limbs and boards cut from this tree to build their huts and to

fence animals. Primitive hunters made arrow poison for hunting from the bark, roots, and disc-like seeds in the tree's fleshy orangered berries.

In the 1800s, physicians added small amounts of strychnine to tonics as a stimulant, even though it's so bitter it can be tasted in concentrations of one part per 400,000. This powerful drug may have gotten its start killing game, but today, doctors prescribe controlled doses to increase muscular activity, and as an antidote for alcohol and drug poisoning.

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

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
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
### NUTCRACKERS SUITE AS CAN BE

Mellville the fisherman, Hoffman the writer, Anthony the clockmaker, Woodson the forester, and dozens more 4"-tall wooden figures make up the Coriander Collection of miniature nutcrackers. They're all the work of Glenn Crider, a 35-year-old with a sense of humor who manages a unique balancing act. He produces fun figures, has still more fun marketing them, yet maintains a consultant's job.

### NUTCRACKERS

Based in a gingerbread-trimmed, cottage-style workshop behind his home in Mechanicsville, Virginia, Glenn's T.R.C. Designs (T.R.C. stands for Three-Ring Circus) focuses on the aura of Christmas and the asso-

ciation with it of nutcrackers. "Even though nutcrackers have been around for about 300 years, they've only been tied in with Christmas through the Nutcracker Ballet." (See the box, below right, for the history of the nutcracker.) "People see it [the ballet], then decide that somebody is going to get a gift of a nutcracker," says Glenn, grinning nearly ear to ear. "And whammo! That's the beginning of a collection."

And where do potential collectors find Glenn and his parade of nutcrackers? At Christmas shows in and around Richmond. Through November and early December, Glenn sets up his booth among the other vendors of holiday crafts. The rest of the yearlike the role of Santa's elf in which he casts himself—he's busy planning and building prototypes, producing figures, and filling mail orders from his inventory.

**Built-in growth for collectors** 

Glenn named his growing array of nutcracker offerings "The Coriander Collection" because their tiny mouths are just the right size to crack a BB-like coriander seed. "But I couldn't call them coriandercrackers!" he laughs.

The unusual size of his nutcrackers-that now include 25 separate characters-didn't come about by accident. Like so many projects a woodworker builds, the decision to go small was dictated by equipment.

"When I started out to make nutcrackers, I only had a minilathe that I used for clock repair and small toys, along with some pretty standard tools," Glenn explains. "The largest diameter I could turn was an inch. And a 1"diameter body scaled out to a figure 4" tall.

"For some reason that size worked, and they sold," he says. "People see that they can collect and display 100 of them, easy. With traditional-sized nutcrackers 15" to 18" tall, they're restricted."

And compared to a full-sized nutcracker at \$100, Glenn's sell for under \$20. By adding a few clever marketing strategies, he continues their popularity.

early 300 years ago, the once-rich deposits birge, Germany, were becoming depleted.

The people faced hard times, or as was the German saying, their lives became "hard as nuts."

The creator of the nutcracker presumably was an Erzgebirge craftsman who began carving in order to support his family during

the local economic depression. Among his carvings was an imagiof ore around Erzge- native figure of a soldier with a hinged jaw and lever to symbolically 'crack the nut.' The figure caught on, and others began to carve the new 'nutcracker.' And almost always, the figures depicted were ones of authority-soldiers, kings, civil servants, and such-those able to crack the figurative nut. Thus, nutcrackers be"From the beginning, I've numbered the nutcrackers in the sequence of their creation," says Glenn. "The Danish guard was the first one, number 201."

Like baseball cards, Glenn's numbered nutcrackers appeal to collectors. But according to him, no one asks for them by number, "They say 'Do you have any more of Woodson? Or Tchaikovsky?'. They become personalities."

And again, like baseball cards from a star player's rookie year, Glenn's characters become rare. That's because he only produces so many (ranging from 12 to 36) of each figure every year after they're first introduced. As the number of figures in the line grows, the number of available earlier ones declines. Eventually, older ones won't be produced.

#### Parts from other parts

Being a practical man, Glenn doesn't hesitate to use ready-made parts for his hand-assembled nut-crackers. In them (see photo on page 27) you'll find hardwood Shaker, tie, and mug-rack pegs, toy-wheel axles, balls, plugs, dowels, and some custom parts, all bought from manufacturers.

Of course, he has to turn and saw out the body and its nutcracking components (the jaw, etc.), and modify purchased parts (by cutting a dowel and regluing it for an angled arm, for instance). Glenn also crafts all the tiny accessories—the swords, the pizza



came objects of political satire, not useful gadgets to crack nuts, as most assume.

In 1816, German writer Ernst Theodor Amadeus Hoffman wrote a fairy tale titled "The Nutcracker and the Mouse King." But it was 1892 when Russian Peter Tchaikovsky composed the the Nutcracker Suite Ballet, based on Hoffman's tale.

trays, all the adornments. For these tiny parts, he employs a woodturning technique long used in Germany for nutcracker manufacture: hoop turning. In the photos below, Glenn demonstrates the technique to produce the tiny gingerbread-man cookie shapes that eventually will decorate the tray held by Cardamon the baker.

Then there's the handpainting and the addition of small tufts of craft. Glenn also shapes, fits, and applies snips of cloth to many of the figures. In the end, there could be many hours of labor in each—that is, if Glenn had to do it all by himself. Rather, cottage-industry style, he subcontracts much of the work to local help.






Turning a "hoop," Glenn's tiny gouge cuts the profile of a gingerbread cookie in yellow poplar. At the bandsaw, he saws off the profiled hoop and slices 550 tiny gingerbread-man shapes from it.

#### Nutcrackers to no end

Glenn's first nutcrackers were standard figures—a soldier, a forester. Buyers could relate to them, he thought. He soon discovered, though, that nutcrackers didn't have to fit the Old World mold.

"I was a little afraid to do an American-style nutcracker at first," says Glenn. "But when I designed Cardamon the baker, the door just swung open. That is, people liked him. The first day of the first Christmas show, I sold all the bakers. The rest were left.

"I found out that people liked the extra ornamentation, the funtype stuff," Glenn adds. "Now, I get tons of questions like, 'Do you have a nurse? A doctor? Or one that works at a computer?' Then I have to explain that I try to issue no more than four new characters each year. I don't want to be producing 200 different nutcrackers at one time because I want each nutcracker to be the best product I can possibly make."

So you can make a nutcracker, Glenn designed one just for WOOD® magazine readers. Watch for it in a future issue.

# BOW-FRONT BLE

### A BEATIFUL BLEND OF CONTRASTING HARDWOODS


oes a wall in your home suffer from a sheer lack of visual interest? If so, then let this beautiful bow-front table help you create an area worthy of high praise. As shown at right, the table serves as the staging area for numerous complementary decorations. And, from a woodworker's point of view, you'll like learning how to bend wood and taper table legs.

Start by building the form

Cut a piece of 34" plywood to 14×39" for the form base. Using the dimensions on the Lamination Form drawing, mark the screwhole centerpoints on the bottom side of the base for attaching the 2×4 supports in the next step. Note that the two outside supports get two screws each. Working from the bottom side, drill and countersink a 5½" shank hole at each marked centerpoint.

2 Crosscut seven pieces of 2×4 to 4" long for the form supports. Mark diagonals on one end of five of the supports to find center. Then, mark a dividing line across the width on one end of each of the two remaining supports. Mark the hole centerpoints on these two remaining supports.

3 Drill a %4" pilot hole 1" deep into each 2×4 support at each marked centerpoint. Using 3" drywall screws (no glue), secure the 2×4 supports to the top face of the base where shown on the Lamination Form drawing. (To allow the five middle supports to pivot and conform to the natural bend of the bowed rail (A), we used only one screw in each.)



4 For aligning the front pieces when laminating the front later, mark a reference line on the center 2×4 support where shown on the Lamination Form drawing.

#### Here's how to laminate the bowed front rail


I From one end of a 4×8 sheet of %" oak plywood, crosscut six pieces 48" wide by 4" long (remember to measure length *with* the grain). See the Cutting Diagram for reference.


2 Cover the form and 2×4 supports with waxed paper.


3 Use spring clamps to dry-clamp the plywood strips together with the ends and edges flush. Mark an alignment line across the top





edge, centered from end to end, on the plywood pieces. Remove the clamps.

4 Using a 3"-wide paint roller, apply white woodworkers glue to the mating surfaces of each layer. Now, using handscrew clamps or C-clamps and 4"-tall blocks of wood, glue the oak plywood strips together and against the supports as shown in Photo A. Keep the bottom edges of the plywood flush with each other and firmly against the plywood base. Position the marked alignment lines on the top edges of the strips so that they align with each other and with the reference mark on the middle support.

**5** Before the glue dries, scrape off as much of it as possible from the top edge of the lamination. Wipe off any squeeze-out that dribbles down the front face of the outermost layer. Allow the lamination

to dry overnight.



Secure the plywood strips to the 2×4 form supports with handscrew clamps until the glue dries.

**6** Using a handsaw, trim the ends of the lamination flush with the back edges of the form supports. See the Lamination Form drawing for reference.

**7** Remove the clamps, and scrape off any remaining glue from the top and bottom edges of the bowed lamination (A). Next, sand both edges smooth. Set the bowed lamination aside for now.

#### Now, let's make the legs


To form the legs (B), laminate two  $34 \times 11/2 \times 291/4$ " pieces together face-to-face, use furniture squares, or crosscut three pieces of  $11/2 \times 11/2$ " stock to 291/4" long.

2 Lay out and cut a 34×4" notch on the top inside face of each leg Where shown on the Leg drawing.

Mark taper-cut reference lines on all four surfaces of each leg.

Then, make a mark 4" down from the notched end of each leg.

**4** To cut the tapers on each leg, follow the procedure described on the Tapering A Leg drawing.



5 Cut the back rail (C) to size.

6 Using the hole sizes stated on the Exploded View drawing, drill mounting holes and screw the two back legs to the back rail (C). Use a framing square to check that the legs are square to the rail. 7 Verify that the alignment marks made when laminating the bowed front still indicate the front center of the bowed front; adjust if necessary. Glue and clamp the center leg, centered on the front rail. Check for square.

8 Drill the mounting holes, and secure the back rail (C) to the front rail/leg assembly.

Topping the table


Edge-join enough 3/4"-thick stock to form a blank for the tabletop (D) that measures 14" wide by 36" long.

2 To copy the front-rail profile and create a %16" overhang on the blank, start by setting the blank good side down on your workbench. As shown in Photo B, position a 36" fender washer next to the rail, place the lead of your pencil inside the hole, and trace the overhang outline onto the bottom side of the tabletop blank. (You could also use a compass to mark the %16" overhang.)

**3** Bandsaw the tabletop to shape. Sand the bandsawed edge to a smooth, continuous arc.



Use a fender washer and pencil to trace the outline onto the bottom surface of the tabletop blank.



Drill the angled screw holes through the bowed lamination with our shopbuilt pocket screw-hole guide.

4 Rout 1/8" round-overs along the top and bottom edges of the rounded front (do not rout along the straight back edge). Sand the base and tabletop smooth.

**5** To attach the tabletop to the base (front and back rails), start by building the pocket screw-hole jig shown on *page* 76.

6 To strengthen the glue joint joining the legs to the front rail, drill the mounting holes and screw and bolt the three legs to the laminated bowed-front rail (A). See the Exploded View drawing and accompanying

Screw-Hole detail for reference.

7 Clamp the tabletop to the base, centered from side to side and with the back edges flush. Next, mark the location reference lines where located on the Pocket Screw-Hole Locations drawing. As shown in Photo C, align the guide with the marks, clamp the guide to the front rail, and drill the angled mounting holes. Drive screws through these holes to secure the tabletop to the base.

### Secure the legs, and add the walnut banding trim


To form the banding strip (E), rout 1/8" round-overs along one edge of a piece of 3/4"-thick walnut 50" long. Then, rip a 3/16"-thick strip from the routed edge.

2 Glue the ¾16"-wide walnut banding strip to the bowed front rail where shown on the Exploded View drawing and accompanying Screw-Hole detail. (We used sliding-head type clamps to hold the strip in place until the glue dried.) Later, trim the ends of the strip flush with the back surface of the back rail.

3 Finish-sand the table and apply the finish. (We used a walnut stain on the oak front rail and left the walnut pieces natural. Then, we brushed on two coats of gloss polyurethane, followed by one coat of satin polyurethane.)

# INTRODUCTS that brought the house down

Woodworking products that brought the house down

Shop math in a fraction of the time

If you're like me, you probably enjoy building projects more than figuring the math that goes into planning them. Chores such as adding feet, inches, and fractions can really get sticky. So I welcomed the chance to try two calculators for woodworkers.

Tape Mate, the first of these math wizards, lets you add, subtract, divide, and multiply while working in feet, inches, and standard fractions. With it you can also calculate in decimal feet and inches, and compute area and volume in just seconds.

The slim, lightweight calculator fits comfortably in the palm of my hand, or my shirt pocket. As shown in the photo below, the Tape Mate comes with a neoprene band that snugly holds the tool onto my 25' Stanley tape measure. Other pluses include its solar cell that eliminates the need for batteries, and an affordable price tag of only \$29.

The one drawback I encountered was the tool's small buttons. You must be extra-careful to punch the right button, especially if you have large fingers.

The second model I tried, the powerful Construction Master III, works in metric and English units of measure. Other functions handle common calculations found in the building industry such as figuring out rafters, stairs, building-material needs, and volumes in cubic feet for a variety of geometric shapes. A user-friendly, example-filled guide book walks you through calculations.

Like the Tape Mate, this calculator comes with a one-year warranty, but costs \$84.90. Yet, for the commercial woodworker and builder, this investment would pay for itself quickly in time savings. I like the larger size of its keyboard buttons and folding vinyl case. It comes standard with a required battery.

Index makes it easy to find any article

WOOD® magazine reader Art Gumbus subscribes to many craft and building magazines. But, like so many of us, this well-read handyman had one small problem. When he needed to locate an article that he remembered from a previous issue, finding it was usually a time-consuming experience. So, like any enterprising do-it-yourselfer, he did something about it.

I recently reviewed his publication, The Guide to Published Woodworking Plans & Techniques, an index to 25 woodworking and do-it-yourself magazines from the U.S., Canada, and England. The product consists of a sturdy, three-ring binder filled with 240 pages printed on heavy-duty 80-pound paper. The pages lie flat and read easily because of the 10-point type. The index is divided into 35 major categories. A section in the rear of the compilation gives you information on ordering back issues from various publishers.


After becoming acquainted with the major categories, I was able to quickly find the source of the article(s) I needed. The book should withstand years of use, even if you regularly take it into the shop.

The publication costs \$24.95, and I'm inclined to believe Gumbus when he told me he developed the index more for his passion of woodworking than profit. He also supplies a yearly update of completely new pages to registered owners for \$15. In the near future he plans to make available a computer-disk version.

#### **▼** Back saver to the rescue



There's no getting around it. If you work with wood, you've probably experienced back pain at some time. Our craft often requires us to lift or push heavy objects, stand on our feet for long periods, or bend at the waist.

Both Lee Gatzke and I have had low-back problems for years, so we decided to give the BacBelt a try. We've worn the belts around our shops, and have found that the firm, yet comfortable, support provided by the belts helps lessen back fatigue.

This product consists of heavy elastic bands that you secure around your waist with hook-andloop fastening material. Internal metal stays provide extra lowerback support, and adjustable suspenders fit over your shoulders.

The BacBelt comes in five waist sizes: 22–28", 28–32", 32–38", 38–47", and 46–56". We found the belts quick and easy to slip on (over our shirts) and adjust.

Although this belt will lessen back fatigue, it won't make you invincible. You still need to use common sense, avoid lifting overly heavy objects, and give your back plenty of rest.

First-class comfort in respiratory and face protection

It's the nature of woodworking—nearly all processes involving power tools generate airborne dust particles. This dust poses a health hazard for all woodworkers, particularly those of us allergic to certain types of wood or mold. To combat the problem, you can wear various dust masks and respirators, but I've always found these uncomfortable, especially in warm conditions. And if you have a beard, dust masks and respirators won't seal tightly around your face.

Recently, I tried an air-filtering device that's comfortable and effective, even on the hottest of days, and works fine for bearded users. The Airlite Air Visor from Racal Health & Safety has a fan, motor, filter, and rechargeable battery housed above the visor. During use a steady stream of fil-

tered air flows over your face and out small holes at the bottom of the visor. (The filter removes dust particles, but does not screen out fumes and vapors.) The entire unit weighs only 1¼ pounds.

In my tests the Airlite Air Visor formed a tight, but comfortable seal around my face. And, I experienced an unexpected benefit. The stream of air kept my face cool and perspiration-free on a day when the temperature in my shop hovered above 80°.

The motor makes a whiney noise that I found objectionable only when I had no machinery running. The impact-resistant, polycarbonate visor provided me with good vision, but it does not flip out of the way. (The manufacturer supplies units with flipup visors, but at a greater cost.)

The basic unit (\$229) comes with a 4-hour battery that in my tests delivered all of its advertised run time and then some. For \$30

more, you can buy an 8-hour battery that clips to your belt. This reduces the weight of the helmet to 1 pound, and adds the 1-pound clip and connecting wire. If you feel you need more than four hours of running time, consider buying a second 4-hour battery for \$36.

Replacement filters cost \$33.75 for a 3-pack. The supplier told me the filters should last 50-75 hours each if you blow them out after each use.

A glowing way to detect glue squeeze-out

Glue blotches around the joints of your woodworking projects can really drive you nuts if you detect them after you apply the finish. Unfortunately, you can't spot the stuff, until you apply an oil, stain, or other finish. That is, until now. Today, you can buy Spotlight, a concentrated glue additive that makes woodworkers' glue glow under the rays of an ultraviolet (UV) fluorescent tube, commonly called a black light. You add the liquid concentrate to yellow or white woodworkers' glue at the rate of 3/3 ounce per quart of glue.

The additive does not change the appearance of the glue, but even the tiniest traces of it shine brightly under the UV light. The glue will glow whether it's wet or dry, so you can check for excess glue at any stage in the completion of your project.

Laser shows where your miter cut will fall

Lasers have been used in industrial and construction applications for years. So, it seemed like only a matter of time before these concentrated beams of light would be built into woodworking tools affordable to the general public. That time has come.

The Porter-Cable model 7700 10" mitersaw has a built-in laser that shows where the kerf will be in your workpiece. By pressing a slide-through button at the front of the blade housing, you can position the .035"-wide light beam to the left or right of the kerf.

After carefully adjusting the laser beam, my degree of error was about 1/4"—good enough for most carpentry tasks. For precision woodworking tasks, such as mitering picture frames, you'll need to cut the workpiece slightly long and trim it to exact length without relying on the laser. I found the laser equally accurate for crosscuts and miters. After several months of use, the laser has remained in proper adjustment.

The laser stays on continually with the saw plugged in, and provides a visual warning of where the blade will cut. Dennis Huntsman of Porter-Cable told me the laser should last 60,000 hours—nearly seven years if you leave the saw plugged in day and night.

Beyond the laser light, the rest of the saw compares favorably with the best 10" angle-only mitersaws on the market. Because of belt-drive, the saw runs quietly with smooth starts and quick, but not jerking, stops. It has a comfortable, horizontal, D-shaped handle, and changing blades proved easy. In terms of capacity, the saw will handle a 2×6 at 90° and a 4×4 at 45°. It comes with a good-quality, 40-tooth, carbidetipped blade.



In my tests the product worked perfectly. By passing the ultraviolet light over some projects prior to applying a finish, I detected excess glue where I never would have suspected finding it. Also, I did not notice any difference in the drying time or bonding power of the glue. Since the product has an indefinite shelf life, I suggest you save money by buying it in larger quantities.

#### Dust collection: A complete and simple solution

A lot of us would like to control sawdust in our shops, but we don't want to spend lots of money on a dust collector, or hassle with installing a complicated collection system. Now, Sears has a reasonably priced dust-collection system that works with shop vacuums.

The Whole Shop Sawdust Collection Kit consists of eight 3' sections of 2"-diameter clear-plastic pipe, two 90° elbows, three 45° elbows, five couplers, four wye fittings, and six blast gates. By hooking up these components to your shop vacuum, you can draw sawdust from up to five machines (one at a time).

I purchased two kits for a system with about 50' of pipe run. On one end of the installation, I hooked up my 2-hp Sears shop vacuum and routed the piping to these tools: a 10" radial-arm saw, 6×48" stationary belt sander, 14" bandsaw, and 12" planer. The system works like a charm. There's plenty of suction at each gate, and I haven't experienced any clogs. In the event of a clog, I


would have located it quickly because of the clear tubing.

With a price of \$80 per kit, I think you'll find it difficult to assemble such a system with PVC pipe for less money. And, the blast gates are sturdier and more airtight than any other plastic ones I've seen.

The instructions indicate that you don't need to fasten the components together. I tried the system this way, and it works fine, but I fastened the joints with plastic tape to hold everything together better. To hold down on the noise made by my shop vacuum, I enclosed it in a closet.

#### Bar-clamp adaptor makes for one-handed clamping

I've been a big fan of clamps that you can position and operate with one hand ever since American Tool Companies introduced the Quick-Grip Bar Clamp several years ago. Now, Adjustable Clamp Company, makers of Jorgensen clamps, have one-handers called E-Z Hold Steel Bar Clamps.

These clamps are exactly like the traditional line of Jorgensen bar clamps, except these versions have the E-Z Hold mechanism

added to the moveable jaw. To operate the clamp, you rest the steel bar in your palm and squeeze the E-Z Hold handle to advance the jaw. By doing this you can snug the clamp into position quickly. Then, you grasp the screw handle and give it a twist for extra clamping pressure.

Since I already have a considerable number of the traditional bar clamps, I was pleased to hear that I could buy an E-Z Hold Adaptor

Kit for about \$6. It took me less than a minute to convert an old clamp into an E-Z Hold clamp.

#### Grid film stars in pattern transfer

No matter what type of woodworking you do, this new product will simplify the task of transferring patterns. Draw & Saw is a translucent plastic film with an adhesive backing. It has heavy grid lines spaced 1" apart, with thinner grid lines 1/2" apart, and tick marks every 1/4" along the grid lines. Like contact paper, Draw & Saw comes in 12"-wide rolls, and has a clear, easily removable film covering the adhesive-backed side.


Here's how it works. First, you transfer the pattern to Draw & Saw. I tried three methods with 81/2×11" sheets and ran them through a plain-paper copier.

Next, I removed the adhesive covering and applied the pattern to my stock. Because you can see through the film, I positioned the pattern to best take advantage of grain patterns. The film adhered well and did not lift during bandsaw and scrollsaw cuts. It came off with little effort, and left no residue on the wood, even after sitting on the stock for a day.

I would like to see the manufacturer make the 1" grid lines a little thinner. Because they're about 1/32" thick, they could interfere with finely detailed patterns. For these intricate patterns, I suggest you buy the nongridded version of the product.

Quick-release C-clamp speeds you along

C-clamps work great when you need a compact clamp that exerts lots of pressure. But, I usually avoid using the C-clamps in my shop because it takes time and effort to turn the screw to the correct jaw depth. The new Hargrave Quick-Release C-clamp changes all of this.

These C-clamps have a button near the screw that you depress to disengage the screw as shown in the photo *below*. This way, the screw slides up and down effortlessly. When you let go of the button, the clamp performs like any

other C-clamp. The solidly built model worked without a hitch in my tests.



# A top contender for king of the mitersaws

If you're looking for a mitersaw with lots of cutting capacity, accuracy, and portability, then consider the DeWalt DW705. I recently gave this saw a thorough test, and came away impressed.

This compound mitersaw has a 12" blade, so it will crosscut a 4×6 or a 2×8, miter a 4×4 at 45°, and tackle 65%" crown moldings or 75%" base moldings. And, it has a miter scale that's the best I've seen in its class. The stainless-steel scale features large, easy-to-read markings, and nine positive stops. Like some high-quality aftermarket rip fences, this saw has a hairline cursor for on-the-money settings. The cursor even has a vernier scale that allows you to set it for partial degrees.

Some other things I like about this saw include its light weight (38 pounds) and top-mounted carrying handle, a beefy knuckle with no play (the knuckle controls the tilt of the blade/motor assembly), a horizontal, D-shaped handle that's comfortable, and a 5"-high left-side fence with a portion that slides left for bevel cuts.






Of course, no tool is perfect, and even this mitersaw has room for improvement. Like most other mitersaws that have helical-gear drive instead of belt drive, the DW705 makes plenty of noise. And, I found it a time-consuming hassle to change blades—it seemed like I needed three hands to do the job efficiently.

The 32-tooth, thin-kerf, carbidetipped blade that comes with the machine has too few teeth for smooth cuts. I ordered a similar 80-tooth blade from DeWalt, and although this was better, I could still see light through my miter joints. My results improved dramatically when I added a blade stabilizer alongside the blade, telling me that this machine requires a full-bodied blade for furniturequality cuts. Buying a quality 12" blade with 80 or 96 teeth will add more than \$100 to your investment.

New biscuit system works with 11/8"-wide stock

Whenever possible, I prefer to join my projects with compressed-wood biscuits. These football-shaped wafers help me produce strong and accurate joints with less time and effort than with dowels.

Standard biscuits have one drawback, however. The smallest size, no. 0, measures 113/6" long, so you would be hard pressed to join a piece less than 23/8" wide with such a biscuit. Woodworker Brad Witt recognized this shortcoming several years ago and came out with a system that uses 11/4"-long biscuits. Now, he's done himself one better by coming out with Itty Bitty Biscuits & Bits.

This system centers around a <sup>13</sup>/16"-long biscuit, and a router bit that cuts a <sup>15</sup>/16"-long slot for it.


Now, you can butt-join pieces as narrow as 11/8", and 45°-mitered workpieces as narrow as 7/8".

In my tests the system worked perfectly. The biscuits fit nicely into the slots cut by the provided bit. As with any compressed-wood biscuits, you must be careful to store these in an air-tight plastic bag. Otherwise, they may absorb moisture and swell up.

# SPACE-SAVIN', WALL-HUGGIN' LUMBER STORAGE RACK



Looking for versatility in a lumber storage rack? This one's got it! Our rack features adjustable supports that attach to vertical 2×4s for holding loads of boards. The unique sheet-goods bin lets you easily sort through heavy sheets and slide out the one you want. There's even between-the-studs storage for short stock and dowels.

# Let's start with the wall framework

Note: We built our rack to fit against an existing drywalled wall. If you have an exposed stud wall and would like to use it, skip this section and build only the storage rack components covered in the later sections.

Measure the distance between your floor and ceiling. The overall height of the rack should be ¼" less than the measured distance.


**2** From 2×4 stock, crosscut the top and bottom plates (A), uprights (B), and spacers (C) to length. Lay out the holes for the board supports on the uprights (B) where dimensioned on the Wall Framework drawing. Bore the %16" holes where marked.


**3** Position the pieces on the floor, and screw the framework together in the configuration shown on the Wall drawing. Square the uprights with the bottom plate.

Caution: Considering the amount of weight this unit can hold, you must securely anchor the framework to wall studs and ceiling joists. If the joists run perpendicular to the top plate, screw through the top plate and directly into them. If the joists are parallel to the top plate, install 2×4 blocking between the joists, and screw the top plate to the blocking.

4 With a helper, lift the wall framework into position. Shim the top plate against the ceiling, and firmly secure the top plate to the joists in your shop's ceiling (we used 1/4" lag screws 31/2" long). If you can hit wall studs, drill 2"-deep counterbored holes through the uprights (B) or spacers (C) and use 3"-long screws to further secure the framework.

5 Secure the bottom plate to your floor (we drilled holes in the concrete, and used plastic concrete anchors and lag screws; masonry screws also would work).

**6** From 3/4" plywood or 1×4s, cut the short-stock bin stops (D) to size, and screw them in place.

Now, let's build the board supports

Referring to the Board Support drawing, cut 21 center sections (E) and 42 plywood side pieces (F) to size.


2 Spread an even coat of glue on both faces of each center section (E), and clamp it between two of the side pieces (F), with the top edges and outside end flush.

**3** After the glue dries, transfer the profile of one of the supports onto one of the laminations. Bandsaw the support to shape, and sand the cut edges smooth to remove the saw marks. Then, use this as a template to mark the profile onto the rest of the supports. Cut and sand them to shape.

# The sheet-goods bin comes next

Using the Sheet-Goods Support drawing and accompanying details, cut the angled supports (G), floor supports (H), and cleats (I) to size. Cut 20° half-lap joints in the H and I pieces where shown on the drawing. Referring to the Cleat detail, miter the ends of the step cleats (I) at 20°.

**2** Cut a  $1\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ " notch in the back of each floor support (H) where shown on the drawing.



**3** Glue and clamp the supports together. After the glue dries, cut off the waste areas, where shown on the Hole detail.

4 Mark the centerpoints and drill a pair of ½" holes in each glued half lap and a single ½" hole above each notch. To strengthen the joints, add a pair of carriage bolts with flat washers and nuts to each half-lap joint.

**5** Drill the mounting holes, and glue and screw the stop cleats to the angled supports (G).

**6** Clamp the support assemblies (G, H, I) to the uprights (B) where shown on the Sheet-Goods Bin Exploded View drawing and accompanying Support detail. Using the previously drilled holes above the notches in H as guides, drill the holes through the uprights. Install carriage bolts to secure the support assemblies to the 2×4 uprights.


7 From 2×4 and 2×6 stock, cut the floor spacers (J, K) and steps (L, M) to length. Drill mounting holes (some need to be angled), and glue and screw the pieces in place. Position each step (L, M), so the back edge won't protrude into the plywood bin and possibly damage any stored sheet goods when pressed against the angled supports.

8 Cut the bin floor (N) and the floor cleat (O) to size. Position the pieces, drill mounting holes where shown on the Exploded View drawing, and attach them to the floor supports (H). To make the sheet goods slide in and out even easier, rub the bin floor with paraffin wax.

**9** Lay out and drill pilot holes on the bin back (P), and attach with wood screws.

**10** Using ½" carriage bolts 3" long with washers and nuts, hang the board supports (E, F) at desired heights on the uprights (B). ♠



Just as any self-respecting cowboy needs a healthy horse, a sturdy saddle, and a strong rope, today's woodworker needs power tools and accessories built for performance and durability. To save you a trip into town, we corraled seven such groups so you can do your comparison shopping on the next 14 pages.

In case you're new to WOOD® magazine and unaware of our tool comparisons, on page 74 we summarize the results of previous tool tests dating back to August 1992. You'll find our recommendations for seven product groups.

We also can help you find the right product in a number of other categories. One year ago, in our November 1992 issue, we covered these power tools: cordless drills, drill presses, jointers, portable belt sanders, routers, scrollsaws, tablesaws, and thickness planers. Nothing cuts a square channel through wood faster than a dado blade or set mounted in your tablesaw or radial-arm saw. With prices ranging from \$25 to \$270, you can imagine that these cutters contrast considerably in quality and performance.

Key buying points

• Stackable or adjustable. For the finest possible results, choose a stackable dado-blade set such as the model left. These sets consist of two, 1/8"-kerf, outside blades and four to six inside blades (called chippers) of varying widths.

If you can live with rougher cuts, take a look at adjustable dado sets. These products have one or two blades affixed to a central hub. By turning the hub you angle the blades slightly for cutting dadoes of varying widths.

- Number of teeth. For the most part, blade sets with more teeth per blade or chipper produce smoother cuts. Each additional tooth also adds to the initial cost of the set, and to the cost of having the set resharpened.
- Shims. To finely adjust a stackable set for any width between ½" and ½6", you need to add thin metal, plastic, or paper shims between the blades and chippers. Note that some sets come standard with these shims. If purchased separately, shim sets cost \$5-\$10.
- Saw alignment. No matter how much money you spend on a dado set or blade, it won't cut worth a hoot if you don't have your saw properly aligned.

In our October 1991 test, these products earned best-value ratings:

- Over \$150: Forrest Dado King; Woodworker's Supply 800-764.
- \$100-\$150: Freud SD308.
- \$50-\$100: Sears 32708.
- Under \$50: Irwin 16120.

Since our last review, Freud has introduced the model SD508. We'll test this product as soon as possible.



# **BANDSAWS**





These do-it-all saws handle everything from fretwork to resawing thick lumber. They excel at cutting curved workpieces including free-form boxes, carving and turning blanks, and furniture parts such as table aprons and cabriole legs.

Cutting capacity. In the chart right we list three key capacities to keep in mind when selecting a saw. The throat capacity refers to the distance between the blade and the saw frame, and tells you the wid-

est cut possible with the machine. *Cutting beight* is the distance between the table and the upper blade guide, and determines the maximum thickness of wood you can cut. Note in the accessories column that some models have optional riser blocks that you can install in the saw frame to increase cutting height by about 6".

Blade widths for the bandsaws listed in the chart vary from 1/16" to 11/2". Narrow blades cut in a tight radius, and will handle all but the most intricate scrollwork. Wide blades work best for resawing thick stock.

• Guide systems. Bandsaws have guide systems above and below the table to keep the blade running smoothly and perpendicular to the table. Look for guides that are sturdy, easy to reach, and quick to adjust. We prefer guides that have hand-operated, fine-adjustment knobs rather than bolts or setscrews.

- Two or three wheels. With the exception of the three-wheeled Delta 28-560, the bandsaws in the chart have two wheels. Threewheel bandsaws have the advantage of giving you plenty of throat capacity for a low price, but you'll find a limited number of these machines. That's because they require more effort to adjust, and have a reputation for breaking blades. Three-wheelers force the blade to bend in a tight radius, causing greater metal fatigue than the larger-diameter wheels in twowheel machines. We recommend you buy a two-wheel bandsaw.
- Quality of construction. You can find out a lot about the quality of a bandsaw by just turning it on and making a few adjustments. First, the machine should be relatively quiet and vibration free. Excessive vibration usually means that the wheels or other critical components are out of balance.

If a machine passes this test, check how smoothly the table tilts. Also, how easily can you reach and secure the knobs for locking the table and for adjusting blade tension? Can you open the cover and change blades with ease? Finally, grip the frame and check it for rigidity.

• The little extras. To help control cutting debris, better bandsaws have dust ports and small brushes that clear sawdust from the lower wheel. If you plan to use a fence or miter gauge with your bandsaw, note in the chart that only a few models come standard with these accessories.

The Delta 28-245 above left came out on top in our April 1992 review of bandsaws.



# PORTABLE CIRCULAR SAWS



Although not considered a precision-woodworking tool, a portable circular saw comes in mighty handy in any shop. No wonder only the electric drill surpasses this tool in ownership by WOOD® magazine readers.

Key buying points

Worm-drive vs. helical-gear models. When most of us think of a portable circular saw, we envision the widely available helical-gear version such

cular saw, we envision the widely available helical-gear version such as the one *above*. These machines have motors at a right angle to the blade. This construction makes them wider and shorter than worm-drive units, that have motors mounted in-line with the

blade. These two types of saws get their names from the type of gear that transfers power from the motor armature to the blade arbor.

Worm-drive saws cost and weigh about 50 percent more than helical-gear saws, and have oil-filled gear casings that need occasional fill-ups. Nevertheless, these saws have certain advantages that make them favorites of some contractors.

First, worm-drive saws have greater torque than helical-gear saws, so they're less likely to bog down. And, because of their long and narrow design, worm-drive saws fit into tight spots and give you greater reach when cutting large panels.

• Size. By far the most popular size for portable circular saws is 7¼" (the largest blade that the machine will accept). A 7¼" machine makes good sense for most of us for several reasons. They will handle any cut through a 2×4, most people can manage their bulk and weight, and you'll find good variety and pricing in 7¼" saws and blades.

However, if you use a portable circular saw only for sheet goods and other material less than 1" thick, consider buying a model with a maximum blade size of 6½" or less. You'll find the smaller saws easier to control and less fatiguing to handle.

Note also in the chart *right* that you can purchase models with blades more than 10" in diameter. For the most part, contractors use saws with 10¼" blades for crosscutting 4x lumber in a single pass. Saws with blades greater than 16" in diameter help you cut land-scape timbers down to size.

- Bearings. Some lower-priced portable circular saws have sleeve bearings supporting their armature or arbor. These suffice fine for occasional users, but will wear out in steady use.
- Arbor locks. More and more portable circular saws these days have arbor locks that hold the blade still while you loosen the blade's locking nut. This sure beats jamming the blade against a piece of wood as you work the blade wrench.

# DUST COLLECTORS Print this article



Today's power woodworking equipment produces mounds of sawdust ranging from fine particles to long shavings. To deal effectively with this debris you need to collect it at its source, before it has a chance to fill the air, or spill onto the shop floor. That's when dust collectors earn their keep.



 Dust collectors versus shop vacuums. Most dust collectors have powerful induction motors designed for continual use, and big fans for moving large volumes of air. On the other hand, shop vacuums have loud universal motors intended for intermittent duty. These universal motors turn extremely fast (20,000-25,000 rpm versus 1725 or 3450 rpm for induction types), and drive relatively small fans. This configuration produces plenty of suction power

(known as static pressure), but relatively little air velocity (cubic feet of air moved per minute).

What does this mean to you? Well, you may be able to get by with a shop vacuum if you need to collect dust from only one machine at a time, and if you can put up with the loud noise. Because most shop vacuums have little storage capacity compared to a dust collector, they quickly fill with debris when attached to machines such as planers that generate lots of shavings.

- Horsepower. The models in the chart right vary in horsepower from ½ hp to 3 hp. Generally, the machines with less than 1 hp will handle only one machine at a time, and do not have enough power for a central-collection system. You can connect most dust collectors with 1-hp motors to a small central-collection system, but you should leave only one blast gate open at a time. Twoand 3-hp units will handle larger collection systems with longer pipe runs, and will effectively draw dust from more than one machine at one time.
- Storage capacity. If you spend a lot of hours in your shop, and work with machines that produce large volumes of shavings, pay attention to the "debris storage capacity" column in the chart. Machines with less than 5 cubic feet of storage will require frequent changes under these circumstances. As the bottom bag fills, the filtration area decreases, and the machine draws less air
- Bag filtration. Unfortunately, you can't tell how effectively a bag filters dust-laden air until you turn on a dust collector. If visible particles pass through the bag, then get a new bag with a tighter weave. Keep in mind that a tighter weave will restrict the volume of air passing through the machine. So, you may have to get a larger tight-weave bag to maintain the air velocity the machine had with a loose-weave bag.

In our September 1992 evaluation of dust collectors, the Grizzly G1029 and Woodmaster 1033 topped 2- and 3-hp units. In the 1-hp range, we preferred the Sears 29978.



# TOOLBUYER'S ROUNDUP

# JIGSAVVS Print this article



No matter how you slice it, a jigsaw can handle a wider variety of cutting tasks than most any other power tool. How well it performs those tasks depends on its design and construction.

Key buying points

Orbital action. If you like fast results, then consider orbital action a must-have feature. Here's how it works. All jigsaws move a blade in a straight, up-and-down fashion. But, those with orbital action also will move the blade forward on every upward cutting stroke. Some models have just one orbital setting; others have several settings that allow

you to fine-tune the cutting action to your workpiece. Orbital action helps the saw cut with greater speed, but it also contributes to chipping.

• Speed control. Most jigsaws have some form of speed control to regulate the number of strokes per minute. If you want smooth, controllable cuts, we suggest you look at models with electronic

speed control. These versions have a dial-operated variable-speed switch separate from the on-off trigger switch. The electronic models have circuitry that monitors the motor and increases power to keep the blade speed constant.

- Roller guides. Most betterquality jigsaws have a roller guide mounted just behind the blade. The guide supports the blade against the rearward pressure of cutting and side-to-side skewing. The roller guides help the saw deliver better cuts, and save wearand-tear on the blade clamp and blade-shaft bearing.
- Handle type. You'll find two types of handles available on jigsaws: closed loop in which the motor housing and handle form a continuous D-shape; and barrel types that you grip by wrapping your hand around the motor housing. For best control in most woodworking applications, we prefer the barrel types with a knob located directly above the blade as shown left.
- Stroke length. Simply put, the longer the blade stroke (the distance it moves up and down), the better. Saws with longer strokes utilize more of the teeth on a blade in each cut, making the cuts faster. Also, you'll go through fewer blades because long strokes help blades stay sharper and cooler through heavy cutting.

In the WOOD® magazine IDEA SHOP™, we use the Bosch 1584DVS pictured above left. This jigsaw requires no tools for blade changes. ♠

# MITERSAVS & Print this article





More and more woodworkers are discovering the benefits of a power mitersaw, such as cutting speed, accuracy, portability, and ease of adjustments. Some models even help you make compound cuts and crosscut stock 12" wide.

Key buying points • Choose the right type. Here's a discussion of the three types of mitersaws listed in the chart right:

Angle-only mitersaws. Usually costing less than \$200, these saws work like an old-fashioned miterbox except that a motorized circular blade, mounted to a rotating turntable, does the cutting. You can cut miters up to 45° to the left or right.

Compound mitersaws work just like the angle-only versions, except that the motor/blade assembly also tilts left up to 45° for compound cuts. In our tests, these versions tended to cut with less accuracy and smoothness than the angle-only versions.

Sliding-compound mitersaws, like the one above have motor/ blade assemblies that slide forward and backward for wide crosscuts (up to 12" on most models). These have sturdier tilt mechanisms than the compound mitersaws, and yield cuts comparable in quality to those achieved with angle-only mitersaws.

Note: For examples of angleonly and compound mitersaws, see our reviews of two such products on pages 39 and 42.

• Cutting capacity. The saws in the chart have blade sizes ranging from 61/2" to 15", with 10" versions being the most popular. That's because 10" blades deliver enough capacity for most woodworkers, and you will find the greatest variety of blades in the 10" size.

We asked manufacturers to supply us with the cutting capacities of their mitersaws as shown in the chart right. Keep in mind that for many of the listed saws, these capacities reflect maximum cutting dimensions, not necessarily the thickness and width of the largest workpiece that the machine will handle. For example, the Milwaukee 6490 will make crosscuts up to 31/2" deep, and as wide as 59/16", but it will not crosscut a 31/2"thick, 5%16"-wide workpiece.

 Blades and blade changing. Most mitersaws come with steel blades capable only of rough cuts. Our advice: replace this blade with a carbide-tipped one with 60 teeth. Otherwise, you won't realize the potential of the machine.

For optimum control with sliding-compound mitersaws, choose a blade with 5° negative hook. These blades cut less aggressively and tend to push the workpiece against the table and fence.

Before making a purchase, check how easily you can change the mitersaw's blade. Some models have arbor nuts obstructed by hard-to-remove blade guards. Spindle locks help make for easy blade changes on some models.

The following mitersaws have earned favorable ratings in previous issues of WOOD® magazine. Angle-only: all Hitachi models, Delta 34-080, and the Ryobi TS254. Compound models: Sears 23468 and Ryobi TS200. Sliding-compound versions: Hitachi C8FB, Sears 23488, and Makita IS1011.



# STATIONARY BELT SANDERS



No matter what your needs might be, there's a stationary belt sander designed to help give you better results. You can choose from tiny strip sanders that fit under one arm to wooddevouring behemoths weighing several hundred pounds.

\*\*Rey buying points

\*\*Belt size.\* As you can see in the chart right, the belts on these machines vary from 1" wide and 30" long to 6" wide and 89" long. The machines with 1"-wide belts (referred to as strip sanders), typically fit on a benchtop. The abrasive strip runs vertically, and comes in handy for metal sharpening, sanding into

tight areas, and other light tasks.

Most of the machines with  $4 \times 36$ " belts are also benchtop units, with the belt running horizontally. These machines perform a wide variety of tasks, but they don't have the power necessary for heavy stock removal.

Probably the most popular size for woodworkers, sanders with 6×48" belts have enough muscle to quickly remove large amounts of stock. Typically, the belt and its supporting platen operate in both vertical or horizontal positions.

For the most part, you'll find belts longer than 48" on edge sanders. With these, the belt is positioned so it faces you and runs horizontally as you stand in front of the machine. A large table allows you to sand the edges of sizeable workpieces.

- Disc size. Most stationary belt sanders have sanding discs alongside the belt, but a few do not (see chart). You'll find discs handy for touchup work on small objects, or anytime you need to sand a perfectly flat surface, such as a miter. Generally, discs range in diameter from 5" to 12". Keep in mind when choosing a model that you can only use about half of the diameter of a disc. So, with a 12" disc you can sand edges up to 6" long.
- Belt adjustments. If you have a chance to personally inspect a model before making a purchase, check how much effort it takes to change belts. With some machines, you need only flip a tension-release lever. Others require you to use handtools to loosen various bolts or screws.

If you can turn the unit on, check the difficulty of making tracking adjustments. Once set, the belt should track true time after time.

• Dust collection. These machines throw off a lot of dust, so we consider dust-collection a mandatory feature. If you buy a machine without dust-collection, you may find yourself fashioning a collection port from sheet metal, plywood, or PVC pipe.



# AGELESS URN

# Classic beauty in a staved turning

When WOOD® magazine Art Director Lee Gatzke starts cutting staves for one of his segmented turnings, you can bet the resulting vessel will be something special. Lee's latest project, this graceful Grecian urn in ash, cherry, and walnut, is no exception. Here's how to turn one just like it.

# We used the following tools and supplies:

#### Stock


See the Bill of Materials


#### Lathe tools

4" or 6" faceplates (You'll need two)
34" and ½" bowl gouges
34" round-nose scraper
34" square-end scraper
Parting tool

#### Lathe speeds

Roughing: 500-800 rpm Finishing and sanding: 1,200-1,500 rpm ut 16 blanks and four pieces of scrapwood to the dimensions shown for parts A in the Bill of Materials. Set the scrapwood pieces aside for now. Bevel each blank on both sides to form the body staves (see





the Stave End View drawing, *left*). To perform the operation safely and accurately, construct the carrier board shown *above*.

Tilt your tablesaw's blade toward the rip fence, 11¼° from vertical or 78¾° from the table. (We used an adjustable triangle from an art-supply store to set the blade. We then made several cuts on scrapwood and gauged the angles to confirm the setting.)

Adjust the saw's rip fence to give a 13/4" cutting width where shown on the top surface of the carrier board base. (Don't set the fence by measuring from it to the blade on the saw table. To allow for the thickness of the carrier board back and the thickness of the board base, make your measurement on the carrier board itself.) Trim off the edge of the carrier board with the saw.


Bevel each side of each blank, placing the stock into the jig with the same edge down for each cut. This maintains the full 13/4" thickness on one edge, which will be the outside of the staved cylinder. (See the Cutting the Staves drawing, top right). Bevel one side on each of the four scrapwood pieces for use later.


Dry-clamp the staves to form a cylinder, using a band clamp. The joints should fit tightly; correct any gaps by sanding with a stationary belt or disc sander. Number the staves, and mark the top of each to enable later reassembly in the same order.

#### Walnut slices spice it up

Measure the width of a stave's sloped side. With the blade still tilted, rip 1/8"-thick walnut stock to that width for parts B. To do this, saw one edge, and then flip the stock to place the opposite face down as you saw the other edge. This way, you'll make the bevels parallel. Crosscut the 16 body accents (B) from the beveled stock.

Glue one accent (B) to the right side (looking at the widest edge) of each stave, using the following procedure for clamping the beveled pieces. Assemble the parts in two groups of eight with





pipe clamps. Arrange the bevels alternately up and down, and separate each A-B set from adjoining ones with waxed paper.

Fit one of the beveled scrapwood pieces (shown above in blue) at each end to provide a clamping surface. Close the clamp lightly to hold the parts and scrapwood packing in position. But don't tighten the clamps yet or the tapered staves will squirt out as you apply pressure.

To keep the pieces aligned, clamp scrapwood bars (shown above in red) across the assembly, perpendicular to the joints. (Be sure to put waxed paper between these bars and the glued-up pieces, too.) Then, tighten the pipe clamps firmly.

#### It's body-building time

When the glue dries, dry-assemble the urn body for a final check of the joints. Then, glue the body segments together. Wrap the glue-up with waxed paper, and clamp tightly with strap clamps around the top and bottom.

After the glue dries, square the top and bottom of the body. You can do that on your tablesaw, using the jig shown in the *top* drawing on *page 63*. With the body in place, position the jig against the miter gauge so the saw will cut about ½" off of the body's end. Secure the jig with screws.

Cut, roll the body to the next stave, and cut again. Continue until you've sawed all around the end. Then, flip the body end-for-

end, place a piece of ½"-thick hardboard between the justtrimmed end and the back wall of the jig, and repeat the operation.

Next, center and glue the body on a ¾"-thick auxiliary faceplate for turning. (We attached the auxiliary faceplate to a 6"-diameter faceplate.) Mount on the lathe.

Start turning the body

With a ½" bowl gouge, round the body to 8" diameter. Draw a line around the turning 2¾" from the top (the headstock end) to mark the major diameter. Establish the 4½" bottom diameter. Now, form a curved taper from the major-diameter line to the bottom. (To check your work, cut a cardboard template of the half-pattern.)


Next, shape the inside of the urn. With the bowl gouge, clean out the interior as far as you can reach, preferably about halfway into the urn. Turn to a uniform wall thickness of 3/16-1/4". (See Stage One of the Body Turning drawing, opposite page.)


Square off the bottom of the body with a square-end scraper. Then, with the parting tool, cut straight in to form the ½"-deep rabbet for the base. (See the Base Rabbet Detail, *left*).

Dismount the faceplate assembly and turning from the lathe. Detach the metal faceplate from the auxiliary faceplate.

#### Get to the bottom of it

Mount the faceplate, with a new 3/4"-thick auxiliary faceplate, on the lathe. Scribe a centered 5"-diameter circle on the face.

Bandsaw parts C and D, and glue them inside the scribed circle. Glue the thicker piece, part C, directly to the auxiliary faceplate.

Round the base assembly (C and D) to about 4¾" diameter. With the parting tool, form a rab-

bet on the tailstock end to mate with the one in the bottom of the urn body. Then, apply glue to the joint and assemble the body and base. Slide the lathe's tailstock up to clamp the pieces until dry.

With the tailstock in position for support, part off the auxiliary faceplate on top of the urn. Turn the top of the body to shape on the outside. Then, complete turning the inside (see Stage Two of the Body Turning drawing). Sand the inside to 220 grit.

True the top edge. Then, cutting straight in from the end with a parting tool, form a 4½"-diameter opening in the top of the urn to receive the neck assembly. (See the Neck Opening Detail.)

#### You're up to your neck

Turn the neck assembly on a 6"-diameter, 1½"-thick auxiliary faceplate. Scribe a 5½"-diameter circle centered on the faceplate. Bandsaw parts E and F, and glue them inside the circle, with part E against the auxiliary faceplate.

Round the neck assembly to 5¼" diameter. Using the bowl gouge, bore the 2½"-diameter neck opening all the way through both parts.

Turn the neck to rough shape, leaving the diameter of the walnut layer slightly larger than the diameter of the body top. Form a rabbet on the neck corresponding to the opening in the top of the body. Check the fit as you work.

Dismount the faceplate, and detach the auxiliary faceplate with the neck attached. Mount the faceplate that has the urn body attached onto the lathe headstock. Apply woodworker's glue around the neck joint, and assemble the body and neck. Clamp with the lathe tailstock, and let dry.

#### You've urned success!

With the neck end supported by the tailstock, finish-turn the outside surface of the urn. Part off the auxiliary faceplate on top of the neck, and finish-turn the rim and inside of the neck.

Sand the completed turning with progressively finer grits from 100 to 320. Apply a clear finish (we used spray lacquer). When dry, buff and wax. Then, carefully part the urn from the auxiliary faceplate. Sand the bottom, sign your name, and finish to match the rest of the urn.


# BENCH CHISELS What to know

For centuries, woodworkers have depended on a sturdy set of bench chisels to get their work done-and with good reason. Primarily, chisels help you square up mortises, dadoes, and rabbets, but you'll also find them handy most any time you need to shave off a little wood or glue. In this article, we'll show you a few chiseling basics, and then share the ways we put chisels to work in the WOOD® magazine shop.

# How to square rounded corners

Power tools such as routers help you remove most of the material from a stopped dado, mortise, or rabbeted opening. Many times, you need to square the corners of these cuts with a chisel in order for the mating workpiece to fit. Here's how to go about it:

Align the edge of a wide (3/4" or wider) chisel along the layout line of the cut and across the grain as shown in the illustration right. Strike the chisel with a mallet so it cuts to a depth of about 1/8". Repeat this step for all of the across-grain stop cuts.



Before we get down to specific uses for chisels, we'd like to share three general guidelines that we've found essential for chiseling success:

• Buy a good set of chisels. Generally, higher-priced models hold edges longer, stand up better to mallet blows, and feel more comfortable in your hand.


 To work with chisels effectively, you must keep them properly honed. For help in this area, see the article "Hollow-Grind Sharpening" in the June, 1986 issue of WOOD magazine.


 No matter what type of work you do, keep in mind the right way to position the chisel's beveled edge. The illustrations below


show three basic types of chisel cuts. Stop cuts define the edges of a chiseled opening. To keep the walls of the opening as square as possible, position the bevel toward the inside of the opening when making stop cuts.

You make stop cuts first so that subsequent stock-removal cuts do not remove more stock than necessary. Note that you position the chisel's bevel against the workpiece for these cuts.

On the other hand, you position the bevel away from the stock for paring cuts. These finishing cuts remove small bits of material to clean and square up a surface, such as the wall of a mortise or dado.









# You say you need to perfect fit?

After cutting the components of a mortise-and-tenon joint, we often fit the tenon precisely to the mortise with fine paring cuts as shown right. Be careful to keep the beveled side of the cutting edge away from the workpiece. If possible, use a chisel that's wider




# before you take a chip off the old block



With a chisel of the same width as the dado or mortise, make a stop cut with the grain as shown *above*. For rabbeted openings use a 3/4"-or-wider chisel.




Now, make stock-removal cuts with the grain as shown above. Once you reach the depth of the stop cuts, repeat Steps 1-3 until you remove all of the unwanted material.



Clean up the bottom of the dado or rabbeted opening with a paring cut as shown above. Note: For help in chiseling the opening for a hinge, see the article "The Perfect Hinge Mortise" in the August 1988 issue of WOOD.




# Tips for putting the squeeze on glue squeeze-out

Sometimes, we forget to remove glue squeeze-out before it hardens. At such times, we can rely on the chisel to rescue us.

As shown *right*, position the chisel edge against the glue squeeze-out as if you were going to make a paring cut. *Make certain that the chisel bevel faces away from the workpiece*. To pop loose the squeeze-out, tap the chisel lightly with the heel of your hand.

Remove any remaining bits of squeeze-out on the other side of the joint by positioning the chisel as shown right. Again, position the bevel away from the workpiece. Little squeeze-out remains at this point, so carefully and gently tap the chisel. Remove any remaining glue with light scraping or sanding.





# Date Jern A CHIP-CARVED THANKSGIVING TREAT

The horn of plenty, a traditional symbol of nature's bounty, sets off this decorative chip-carved plate. Add the graceful rim design of leaves and wheat, and you'll have a carving to display not only at Thanksgiving, but throughout the year.

### Tools and supplies

#### Stock

Wooden plate. (For photography, designer Pam Gresham carved a custom-turned plate. Use any wooden plate with a 71/2"-diameter center and a rim about 13/4" wide. Pam recommends the one listed in the Buying Guide.)



Think of chip carving as engraving on wood. It's a matter of cutting away precise chips of wood to create an incised design.

To form the V-groove lines in this design, make two knife cuts. First, incise the pattern line in one direction, holding the cutting knife at a 60–70° angle to the sur-



face. Then, turn the wood and carve in the opposite direction, releasing a wedge-shaped slice.

On tight curves, try this: Carve the outside first, holding the knife straight up. Then, slant the knife to carve the inside of the curve.

#### Start in the middle

Draw perpendicular centerlines on your plate, forming a cross extending to each edge. Photocopy the full-sized center pattern. Place the *red* centerlines over the plate centerlines, and trace the *black* carving lines onto the plate.

Carve in the numerical sequence shown. This helps achieve the design's effect of stacked fruits and vegetables.

For the wheat tassels, hold the stab knife with the handle straight up and the sharp edge toward you. Press the point into the wood near the stalk, and then rock the handle toward you.

A rope border pattern (carve it as a series of curves) makes up

the cornucopia body. At the mouth, work from left to right.


Note that a rib runs along the center of four leaves in the wheat design at the bottom (no. 37). Carve each leaf as two chips, one on each side of the rib (see illustration). In this case, carve beside the pattern line.


#### Get down to the border


Draw a centered pencil line around the rim. Then, mark the midpoint of each of the quadrants between the plate centerlines. (Eyeballing is close enough.)


Center a maple leaf at each mark and at each centerline, a total of eight leaves around the rim. Note their orientation. Add the wheat stalks between the leaves. Draw lines 1/8" from the outside and inside of the rim.

Carve a series of adjacent chips for the maple leaves, leaving ribs as with the wheat leaves in the center. Work right to left to keep the already carved portion behind









Sometimes, simpler is better, as in the case of this striking wall hanging. Just cut the identical diamond-shaped pieces making up the design in quantity on a tablesaw fitted with a miter gauge and stop. Then, add a little paint to enhance the design and match your decor.

Start with the backboard and quilt pieces

From 1/8" plywood, cut the 10%"-square backboard to size.

2 Rip four 1"-wide by 24"-long strips from 1"-thick (%" actual) cedar. (We bought a 1×8" cedar board 4' long with one planed and one rough surface at a local home center.)

3 To machine the 3/8"-thick stock

for the diamonds, you can position your rip fence 3/8" from the inside edge of the blade. Then, with the rough surface against the fence, resaw a 3/8"-thick strip from each 1"-thick piece. Discard the scrap. You also can plane the  $\frac{7}{8} \times 1''$  strips to  $\frac{3}{8}''$  thick.

4 Attach an auxiliary wooden fence to your miter gauge, and angle it 30° from square. Raise the

tablesaw blade 1/2" above the saw table. Miter-cut one end of one of each 3/8"-thick strip, making a cut through the fence. Using the setup on the drawing titled Miter-Cutting the Diamonds, clamp a stopblock to the auxiliary wooden fence, and miter-cut a diamond to shape. Adjust until the diamonds are the same exact size and shape as the full-sized pattern piece.

5 As shown in the photo at right, miter-cut 50 wood diamonds to size. For safety, use the eraser end of a pencil to hold the piece against the miter-gauge fence and stopblock until you complete the cut. Push the miter gauge completely past the blade, and use the pencil to slide the cut piece out of the way. For photo clarity, we've

removed the blade guard from our tablesaw.

6 Mark a pair of centerlines on the front face of the plywood background where shown on the Base Assembly drawing.

7 Paint three sets of diamonds (fourteen diamonds of each color). (To keep the textured look, we painted the rough surface of the cut cedar.) We used Americana acrylic colors made by DecoArt; see the color code accompanying the Quilt Pattern drawing and the Buying Guide for our color selection. Set the painted diamonds aside to dry.

#### Add the border strips


Cut two pieces of stock to 38 × 34 × 10 78" and two to 38 × 34 × 10 1/8" for the border strips. (We used cedar).


**2** To stick the wooden diamonds to the backboard, spread a thin, even coat of ceramic tile adhesive







(we used DAP Weldwood brand) onto each diamond. You could also use instant glue on the back of each piece. Starting in the center and working out, position the painted diamonds on the marked centerlines where shown on the Base Assembly drawing. Adhere the border strips in the same manner.

**3** Allow the adhesive to dry overnight. Then, apply a clear finish. (We used a light coat of Deft aerosol lacquer.)

#### Now, let's add the oak frame

Check with a local picture framing shop, and have them cut two mats to 10%" square. Then, have him or her cut openings in the pieces to the sizes stated on the Exploded View drawing. Have one piece of single-strength nonglare glass cut to size.

2 Next, cut a piece of 3/4"-thick oak to 11/8" wide by 54" long for


the frame pieces.

3 Cut a ¼" rabbet %" deep along one edge of the long strip. See the Section View detail accompanying the Exploded View drawing for reference.

4 Rout a 1/8" round-over along the inside edge where shown on the Exploded View drawing and accompanying detail. Next, rout a 1/4" round-over along the outside edge of the stock.

5 Miter-cut the frame pieces to length. Glue the frame parts together, checking for square. Sand the assembled frame smooth, then stain and finish it.

**6** With the frame upside down on a towel (to prevent scratching it), fit the glass, mats, and quilt pattern into the frame. Install glaziers points to hold the pieces in place. 7 To add a dust cover, spread a thin, even coat of woodworker's glue on the back edge of the oak frame. Dampen a piece of heavy paper (we cut up a brown grocery bag) and apply it to the glued back edge of the frame. Let the paper dry naturally, or use a hair drier to speed up the process. If any wrinkles develop, dampen those areas and dry them with a hair dryer. Trim the edges of the paper dust cover even with the back edges of the frame.



8 Locate the center along the top edge of the frame, and nail a sawtooth hanger in place. Display your wood-quilt wall hanging where family members and visitors can enjoy it.








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# WINNERS IN PREVIOUS PRODUCT REVIEWS

present a complete rundown of all major tools and woodworking products in one issue of WOOD® magazine, but we just don't have the space. The next best thing, however, is to provide you with the tool and product picks from the categories not included in the main sections of this magazine. These items earned "buy" recommendations in issues dating back to the August 1992 issue.

To find the addresses and phone numbers of the manufacturers mentioned here, see the listing on page 72. Listed below you'll find the recommended products preceded by the issue in which the original comparison article appeared.

#### August 1992, an evaluation of 59 finish removers

In this exhaustive test we found that methylene-chloride-based products easily outperformed other stripping formulations. Among the methylene-chloride solutions, we especially liked the spray-on types, including Dad's Easy Spray and Klean-Strip Non-Flammable Sprayable.

Methylene-chloride products can be damaging to your health if you don't follow all of the necessary precautions for eye, skin, and respiratory protection, so we also looked at today's so-called "safe" finish removers. You'll find these products more pleasant to use, but they take longer to work. Our top choices in this group were Woodfinisher's Pride (paint or varnish formula), and Peel Away 6.

#### December 1992, 13 biscuit joiners

The DeWalt DW682 (about \$230) stood out as the overall best value. Also earning high value ratings were the Virutex AB-11 and Ryobi JM-100K.



#### •February 1993, 13 random-orbit sanders

In making our selections, we broke these machines into two categories: units costing less than \$90, and those selling for more than \$90. The under-\$90 machines should suit most home hobbyists and part-time professionals. If you need an aggressive machine that will hold up in daily use, you'll need to spend more than \$90.

Our favorite picks in the under-\$90 category: Black & Decker 7474, Ryobi R\$115, and Porter-



Cable 333. Among machines priced over \$90, we liked these models: Bosch 3283DVS, Porter-Cable 7336, and Skil 7484.



·April 1993, 29 finishing sanders

We divided these machines into three categories according to the size of their sanding pads. Among Porter-½-sheet sanders, we

liked the Bosch 1290D best, with the Elu 4015, Milwaukee

> 6014, and Porter-Cable 505 close on its heels. In 1/4sheet (palm) sanders, our top picks were the Porter-Cable 330, DeWalt DW411. Milwaukee 6017, and Sears 11602an excellent

value at \$38.

If you can't afford to buy a 1/2sheet sander and 1/4-sheet sander, you may want to compromise by purchasing a %-sheet model. In this category we prefer the Ryobi S45.

#### August 1993, three brands of 4-in-1 machines

These machines will plane, mold, sand, or saw stock. In our comparison, we found it to be a toss-up between models manufactured by RBI and Woodmaster. If you're interested in purchasing one of these versatile machines, contact both manufacturers and ask about a model tailored to your specific milling needs.

#### September 1993, 32 models of 10" circular saw blades

Blades with 40 or 60 teeth with alternate-top-bevel (ATB) grinds were the best all-around performers in this test. The best of the bunch was the Forrest 40-tooth Woodworker II (costing about \$110). For less than half as much money, these circular blades perform nearly as well: Amana 610600, Freud models LU72 and LU88, and Oldham/U.S. Saw Wizard Elite 1007740T.

For velvety-smooth, chip-free crosscuts and miters, the 80-tooth Freud LU85 had no equal among blades costing less than \$100. It was also the quietest blade we tested. Among rip blades, the 30tooth Systi Matic 10GR30 earned top honors.

#### October 1993, 10 lathes priced under \$600

The Delta 46-700 (about \$440) was the best value among these machines, but several other lathes also earned our praise. Among models priced \$300 and under, the Sears 22816 and Record DML 24 performed well. The Jet JWL-1236 was tops among models costing more than \$500. Only the Jet comes with a stand.

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


# POCKET-HOLE DRILLS



Equipped with this handy shop aid, you can drill quick, accurate pocket holes for fastening face frames to cabinets, aprons to tabletops, and other similar tasks requiring angled mounting holes.

To build the drill guide shown at *right*, just follow the instructions on the drawings *below*. Then, try it on our bow-front table on *page 33*.






#### STEP ONE


From  $1^{1}/_{16}$ " stock, cut a block to  $2^{3}/_{8} \times 3^{1}/_{2}$ ". Adhere the full-sized pattern to it. Locate and bore a  $9/_{16}$ " hole, using a spade bit in the drill press. Bandsaw the guide to shape.

#### STEP TWO

Clamp a 3" length of 1/4" iron pipe (9/16" O.D.) into a machinist's vice. Using a 3/6" twist drill, slowly ream out the inside of the pipe to 3/6". Epoxy the pipe into the 9/16" hole, flush with the top of the block. After epoxy sets up, hacksaw the pipe off at an angle to match the block. Use a stationary sander to sand the pipe flush. Break sharp edges of steel with a file and emery cloth.



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
Warped wood—the sequel

I recently built a coat tree, but when I got the four pieces for the center pole laminated and cut to size, I noticed that one of them had a warp which was bad enough to make the assembly doubtful. What could I have done to save this piece and the invested labor?

James R. Daneker, Cranston, RI

You have run afoul of one of the frustrating realities of woodworking, Jim. Unfortunately, wood moves, and it has no concern over how this movement will affect our work. We recommend that you rough-cut pieces for the project, then stack and sticker them for several days to allow the wood to adjust. Any twists, warps, or other changes in the material can then be corrected by planing or jointing.

From time to time, a rough-cut piece will move to the point of being unusable. We suggest you cut up these pieces for smaller projects or eventually put them in your scrap bin. This may cost more in material, but your resulting projects will be less likely to self-destruct with weather changes.






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

Wants a rigid-arm scrollsaw


I found in your September 1991 issue an article on the merits of C-arm and parallel-arm scrollsaws. Interesting and informative as it was, I have a problem with these types of scrollsaws. I am a user of and enthusiast for the rigid-arm scrollsaw. In fact, I'd like to replace my old one with a new one, but they are very expensive, around \$1,600 for Powermatic's model. I can afford one in the \$300 to \$500 range. Do you know where I could find one?

You might find a used one in that range, Hearl, but before you spend your bard-earned dollars, we suggest you take a look at the new C-arm and parallel-arm saws on the market. You can find very good models in your price range. We asked our scrollsaw expert, Rick Hutcheson to explain why.

"I have five scrollsaws: two C-arms, two parallelarms, and one rigid-arm, "says Rick. "The only reason I have the rigid-arm was to find out why some people think they are so good.

"I have three basic problems with the rigid-arm: First, you can't adjust the tension to anything near what you can on the C-arm and parallel-arm saws.



This causes the blade to flex and makes exact work more difficult.

"Second, you only have power on the down stroke with rigid-arm saws. The up stroke is provided by a spring. The other two types have power on both strokes, making work more even and precise.

"Third, the only way to vary speed on the rigid arm is to change belts and pulleys. The other types bave electric variable-speed controls available,' Rick says.

"The only real advantage I can think of for the rigid-arm saw is that the blade does run perfectly perpendicular to the table. The C-arm saw does bave a slight undercut. This small angle is not noticable in a piece under 1/4" thick."

"The other advantage of the newer types is they cut much faster, and that's important for someone like me, who scrollsaws for a living."

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
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

### Trees need a trusty roll-on, too

In action similar to the human immune system, healthy trees generate pitch and other resins that ward off insect attack. But trees under stress, such as from a drought, produce less of these guardian materials. Stressed trees also give off a telltale odor that alerts their condition to pest predators, according to research done by the U.S. Forest Service.

Bark beetles and nasty gypsy moths, say researchers, home right in on this stressed-tree odor. Then, infestation begins. And so far, there's no mask for the musk.


#### Passion for pencils and pens

To listen to Sandra and Neil Kenny of Claremont, New Hampshire, wooden pen and pencil sets are the best thing that have happened since sliced bread. That's because the couple will produce and sell a great many of them this year. And they'll make them all in their shop employing techniques learned in WOOD magazine.

"My husband, Neil, and I were looking through an issue of WOOD and came to an article on how to make wooden pens. We said 'Let's do it.' And that's how Ye Olde Hampshire Quillworks was born," recalls Sandy. (See "The Write Stuff," August 1991 issue, and the note below.)

"Neither of us had any experience with woodworking machines," says Neil, "but we must have had a natural instinct because it all came together." Now, the couple's basement workshop has a full complement of machines. And the Kennys continue to build on their original marketing concept: company premiums.

For California's Gallo Wineries, they made pen and pencil sets from white oak brandy-barrel staves. For the University of New Hampshire, dyed and pressurized wood in the school's colors became catchy writing instruments. And they have received orders from the state's governor's office

for gift sets to give to dignitaries visiting New Hampshire.

From the beginning, the Kennys have expanded their product line. It now includes fountain pens, roller-ball pens, perfume pens, as well as letter openers and magnifying glasses that complement the initial pens. They've also become juried members of the prestigious League of New Hampshire Craftsmen.

Neil and Sandra credit promotion, persistence, patience, lots of research-and one article-for their success. "But it's still unbelievable," says Neil.

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#### FOOLED BY A FOREST

Director Michael Mann's search for a stand-in for a 1757-vintage forest where he could film parts of his movie, Last of the Mobicans, led him to North Carolina. There, around Lake James, was a forest that looked very much like the old-growth trees once typical in the upstate New York setting of James Fenimore Cooper's novel.

But according to the Charlotte Observer, Mann's choice was convincing, but way, way off. The trees at the movie site were only 30 years old, having been planted after a clearcut. The forest products company that owns the land plans to clearcut the forest again in 20 years, when the trees finally reach maturity.

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
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
